MINUTES

CALL TO ORDER

The Oklahoma Conservation Commission met Thursday, August 1, 2019, in the Agriculture Building Conference Room located at 2800 N. Lincoln in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The meeting was called to order at 9:30 a.m. by Chair Karl Jett. He stated this was a regular scheduled meeting held in accordance with the Open Meeting Law, Title 25, Oklahoma Statutes, Sections 301 and following as amended. The agenda for this meeting was posted at 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, July 31, 2019, at the front entrance of the Oklahoma Agriculture Building.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mr. Bill Clark led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance.

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS REGULAR MEETING

A motion was made by Mr. Clark and seconded by Mr. Herriman to approve the minutes of the July 1, 2019 Commission meeting as written. Those voting aye were: Jett, Campbell, Herriman, and Clark. Nay votes: none. Motion carried.

RECOGNITION OF COMMISSION EMPLOYEES

Shannon Phillips, OCC Water Quality Division Director, presented Blane Stacy with an award for five years of service at the Oklahoma Conservation Commission. She stated that Mr. Stacy has been instrumental in the success of the Soil Health program and that our agency is lucky to have him on board.

Trey Lam, OCC Executive Director, presented Robert Toole with an award for twenty years of service at the Oklahoma Conservation Commission. He read a brief statement reviewing Mr. Toole's service and noting Mr. Toole was instrumental in the adoption of Port Silt Loam as the state soil.

Robert Toole, OCC Abandoned Mine Land Division Director, presented Henry Roye with an award for thirty years of service at the Oklahoma Conservation Commission. He read a brief statement reviewing Mr. Roye's service. Mr. Roye thanked Toole, Mike Sharp, and Dianne Ireton for all their assistance over the years.

Shellie Willoughby, chair of the Awards and Recognition Committee, presented Karla Spinner, WQ Environmental Scientist and Records Manager with an award for Employee of the Quarter at the Oklahoma Conservation Commission. She read a brief statement submitted on Mrs. Spinner's behalf.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF RECOMMENDATIONS FOR APPOINTMENT OF CONSERVATION DISTRICT DIRECTOR

Mrs. Owen presented the recommendation for appointment of conservation district directors as listed in Exhibit #4. She recommended approval as presented. A motion was made by Mr. Herriman and seconded by Mr. Clark to approve the recommendations as presented. Those voting aye were: Jett, Campbell, Herriman, and Clark. Nay votes: none. Motion carried.

REVIEW OF CONSERVATION DISTRICT SPECIAL ELECTION RESULTS FOR DISTRICT DIRECTION ELECTION FOR POSITION #3 (EXHIBIT #5)

Mrs. Owen presented the results of the special election held in the Wagoner County Conservation District. No action was required to be taken.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF FY2020 – FY2024 LONG RANGE PLANS (EXHIBIT #6)

Mrs. Owen recommended approval of the FY2020 – FY2024 Long Range Plans as listed in Exhibit #6. Mrs. Owen also noted that submission of the Long Range Plans is currently 87% complete. A motion was made by Mr. Campbell and seconded by Mr. Clark to approve the plans as presented. Those voting aye were: Jett, Campbell, Herriman, and Clark. Nay votes: none. Motion carried.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF JOINT PLANS OF OPERATION FOR JULY 1, 2019 TO SEPTEMBER 30, 2020 (EXHIBIT #7)

Mrs. Owen recommended approval of the Joint Plans of Operation as listed in Exhibit #7. Mrs. Owen also noted that submission of the Joint Plans of Operations is currently 67% complete. A motion was made by Mr. Herriman and seconded by Mr. Campbell to approve the plans as presented. Those voting aye were: Jett, Campbell, Herriman, and Clark. Nay votes: none. Motion carried.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF THE STATE COST SHARE PROGRAM GUIDELINES FOR SOIL HEALTH INITIATIVE PROGRAM YEAR 21 (EXHIBIT #8)

Mrs. Sawatzky, Conservation Programs Director, presented to the board the guidelines for the Oklahoma Cost Share Program Soil Health Initiative Program Year 21. She stated that this program year is the pilot for the Soil Health Initiative focus and that the program will be run somewhat differently than a standard program year. The largest difference being that the districts within each NRCS team will work together to administer the program rather than individually. Mrs. Sawatzky further stated she anticipates holding at least two teleconference trainings to help assist districts in rolling out the program. The soil health initiative program has a funding amount of one million and eight thousand dollars (\$1,008,000). A motion was made by Mr. Herriman and seconded by Mr. Clark to approve the cost share guidelines as presented. Those voting aye were: Jett, Campbell, Herriman, and Clark. Nay votes: none. Motion carried.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE RATIFICATION OF THE FOLLOWING DECLARATION OF ABANDONED COAL MINE EMERGENCIES (EXHIBIT #9)

Robert Toole, Abandoned Mine Land Division Director, led a brief discussion of the Ashley, OK 2019-04-04 and Wagner, OK 2019-05-05 emergencies. He stated that in both instances there was a mine collapse in an active hay meadow and active cattle feeding area. The Ashley emergency occurred near Bokoshe, Oklahoma; the Wagner emergency occurred near

Wilburton, Oklahoma. Mr. Toole would recommend ratification of the emergency declarations as presented in Exhibit #9. A motion was made by Mr. Clark and seconded by Mr. Herriman to ratify the declaration as presented. Those voting aye were: Jett, Campbell, Herriman, and Clark. Nay votes: none. Motion carried.

ABANDONED MINE LAND DIVISION EMERGENCY PROGRAM PRESENTATION

Mr. Roye, Abandoned Mine Land (AML) Division Emergency Coordinator, gave a presentation providing an overview of how the AML emergency program is conducted and the process of reclamation. No action required.

CONSERVATION PARTNERSHIP REPORTS

Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry: Morgan Vance, ODAFF Public Information Officer, provided no report, but asked if the board had any questions.

Natural Resources Conservation Service: Gary O'Neill, NRCS State Conservationist for Oklahoma, provided the following report:

- NACD South Central Meeting was successful
- Conservation Innovation Grant application period closed on August 30
- New CART tool will roll out October 1; tool to integrate technical and ranking applications all into one; national training meeting will be held in Norman August 27 29
- Farm Bill slated 10% of EQIP funding for addressing groundwater concerns meetings will be held to discuss implementation, NWQI process; hope to roll out with 2020 EQIP
- EQIP flood initiative has 35 sign-ups for cover crop plantings; may need additional funding
- Landowner meetings for ECP and EWP easements will be held
- Obligation of contracts is well underway: EQIP currently has 725 contracts obligated at \$18,000,000; CSP has 325 regular program and 1645 Grassland Conservation Initiative contracts pre-obligated at \$19,000,000 final funding will be distributed by team
- 21 summer interns visited the state office to make their final presentations; many of the presentations were on flood control structures. August 1 ends the tour of duty for most of the interns.
- The 8th annual Nation to Nation conference will be hosted by the Quapaw Nation August 19 & 20

Oklahoma Association of Conservation Districts: A written report was provided and is attached.

OKLAHOMA CONSERVATION COMMISSION MEMBERS

Mr. Jett stated that the South Central meeting seemed a success and he especially appreciated the commentary during the bus ride.

Mr. Campbell stated that the Arcadia outreach meeting was a success and thanked Blane

Stacy for assisting with the plant ID during the event; he also thought the South Central meeting was excellent.

Mr. Herriman stated that he enjoyed the South Central meeting and thanked the staff and partners for putting together a great event.

Mr. Clark stated that he also enjoyed the South Central meeting and is excited to see how the new Cost Share program goes. He also stated Amy Seiger is working with his home district for a soil health grazing workshop on September 7.

OKLAHOMA CONSERVATION COMMISSION STAFF

Executive Director: Mr. Lam stated a written report is in the packet. Mr. Lam also thanked the staff and partnership for the work that went into the South Central Meeting; he felt it was a great showcase of Oklahoma.

Water Quality Program: Mrs. Phillips stated a written report is in the packet. Mrs. Phillips reported that there were 12 new Non Point Source Success Stories; she provided an updated Success Stories map also, which is attached.

Office of Geographic Information and Technical Services: Mike Sharp, Director, stated a written report is in the packet. Mr. Sharp also reported the following:

- OKMaps layers for AML projects have been added

Abandoned Mine Land Reclamation Program: Robert Toole, AML Program Director stated that a written report was in the packet of information and he would answer questions anyone had. In summary he said that the AML Program continues to advance their mission of protecting lives, repairing scarred land, and improving the environment. Hearing no questions, he concluded by informing the Commission that a discussion paper has been circulated to the U.S. House of Representatives that will hopefully be introduced as legislation after the recess. The paper is proposed legislation to reauthorize and extend the collection of fees that fund the AML Program. He stated that he and Trey Lam have already been discussing strategy and that as soon as the legislation is introduced in the House we will activate a campaign. He said conservation districts have been visited and solicited for support and all have expressed support to date. He said companion legislation has already been introduced in the Senate.

Conservation Programs: Tammy Sawatzky, Director stated that a written report was in the packet. Mrs. Sawatzky reported the following items:

- Lots of time spent on drafting the new SHI program guidelines
- Processing quite a few operation and maintenance requests
- South Central meeting was successful; felt the visit to Rock Creek went well

Assistant Director: Lisa Knauf Owen reported on the following items:

- Thanked Carol Crouch for all her assistance with South Central meeting, especially with the Monday night dinner and site visit at the Chickasaw Cultural Center
- Trey Lam was honored by the South Central Employees Association with the Distinguished Service award
 - Has been working with Districts regarding new hires and OPERS retirement issue
 - FY19 claims for reimbursement are due August 2

- Feral Swine grant proposals are due August 19

I GENERAL

The Conservation Cost-Share Program Soil Health Initiative (SHI) will focus on the natural resource concerns of:

- soil erosion caused by wind and water due to poor land practices
- unprotected soils and decreased infiltration
- soil health degradation caused by a loss of organic matter
- erosion and compaction due to poor land management practices
- water quality degradation due to excess nutrients and sediments.

Conservation district participation in the SHI is voluntary. Districts that choose to participate shall work together based on the 21 Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) teams (see attached). Conservation districts within each team shall establish a Soil Health Initiative Work Group (SHIWG) made up of conservation district directors and staff. Working with your team's district conservationist a NRCS technical representative will be selected to work with the SHIWG.

The Conservation Commission herein establishes the complete list and description of the SHI policies and conservation practices approved for use by conservation districts during Program Year 21. See Section II for the approved list of conservation practices with their respective cost-share rates. State cost-share average costs (unit cost) are based on Oklahoma NRCS data.

Any exceptions from these established SHI policies and guidelines shall be approved by the Conservation Commission.

II ALLOCATION OF FUNDS

A. Soil Health Initiative

The Conservation Commission allocates \$1,008,000 of FY 2019 appropriations to the Conservation Cost-Share Fund for the purposes of providing cost-share payments to eligible participants for implementing approved soil health cost-share conservation practices.

B. Conservation District Allocation

The amount of funds allocated to each conservation district from the FY 2019 appropriation for the Soil Health Initiative Program Year 21 is \$12,000. These funds will be available to conservation districts on August 19, 2019. Allocations for conservation districts that choose not to participate will be returned to the Conservation Commission Cost-Share Fund.

III POLICIES

A. Soil Health Initiative Work Group (SHIWG)

Each participating conservation district board must designate a SHIWG member that is authorized to make decisions on behalf of the conservation district. The

work group member can be a conservation district board member or a conservation district employee. The primary duties of a SHIWG member is to vote the interest of their conservation district board and report monthly on SHIWG activities. Conservation district board members participating in the SHI are not eligible to be a member of the SHIWG.

The SHIWG shall work with the NRCS team district conservationist to designate a work group technical representative. The designated technical representative will assist in developing conservation plans and determining the need for conservation practices. The representative will also be responsible for design and layout of approved conservation practices, determining compliance with approved standards and specifications, and certifying conservation practice quantities and completion of conservation practices.

Members of the SHIWG shall select a work group leader and recorder. The leader will be responsible for conducting SHIWG meetings and communications. The recorder will be responsible for recording the minutes of SHIWG meeting.

B. Allocation Period

The allocation period shall start August 19, 2019 and end March 31, 2020. Any funds allocated to conservation districts and not obligated during the allocation period for Program Year 21 will be released by the conservation district and made available for reallocation by the Conservation Commission. Funds become obligated to a participant after approval of the application by the SHIWG and a performance agreement has been signed and dated by the conservation district board and the participant.

C. <u>Conservation Practices</u>

Each SHIWG may select any of the approved cost-share conservation practices within the SHI for inclusion in their guidelines. The selection should be based on practices that will best address the SHI's natural resource concerns. Cost-share practices shall be implemented according to NRCS standards and specifications.

D. Average Costs

State average cost (unit cost) for these practices is based on Oklahoma NRCS data. In order for a variance to be considered the request must be in writing and accompanied by supporting data compiled by the SHIWG. The variance rate must be approved by the Conservation Commission prior to the SHIWG's approval of applications and performance agreements being signed.

E. <u>Cost-Share Payments</u>

The minimum cost-share payment amount that shall be made to any participant from these funds is \$100. The maximum cost-share payment amount that shall be made to any participant from these funds is \$5,000.

F. Cost-Share Rate

The Conservation Commission establishes a cost-share rate of 85% for SHI practices.

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G. Eligibility

Applicants for the SHI must be a conservation district cooperator with a conservation plan. Applicants approved in Program Year 20 cannot be approved for the same conservation practice on the same property in Program Year 21.

Conservation Commissioners, Conservation Commission staff, conservation district employees or the spouses of any of these people shall not be eligible to participate in the SHI.

Conservation district directors are eligible to participate in SHI. Due to the limited amount of funds available for Program Year 21 individual directors should give careful consideration to public perception when making their decision to participate in the Program. If the local board votes to allow board members to apply for Program Year 21 the guidelines below will be followed.

- 1. Individual conservation district board members applying cannot discuss any element of the Cost-Share Program including but not limited to practices, rates, average costs, selection criteria, application approval/disapprovals, cost-share payments, and extensions.
- 2. Individual conservation district board members applying for the Cost-Share Program must abstain from voting on all elements of the Program.
- 3. Individual conservation district board members cannot use their position as a conservation district board member to improve or elevate their individual chances of becoming a successful applicant.

H. Agreements

All Program Year 21 performance agreements must be signed and dated by the SHIWG member that represents the participant's home conservation district on or before March 31, 2020. All Program Year 21 performance agreements must be completed and the check in the hand of the participant on or before March 31, 2021. Installation of conservation practices cannot begin until an effective performance agreement is in place. A performance agreement becomes effective on the last date of signature. Each participant should have only one performance agreement.

Each participant is required to sign a maintenance agreement. Completion of the maintenance agreement and signature of the participant are required prior to the disbursement of the cost-share payment.

IV APPROVED CONSERVATION PRACTICES

Contained in this section is a list of all conservation practice's approved for use in the Program Year 21. The SHIWG shall only use conservation practices listed here unless a special request is approved by the Conservation Commission. In order for a conservation practice special request to be considered the request must be in writing and accompanied by supporting documentation. The special request must be approved

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by the Conservation Commission prior to the SHIWG's approval of applications and performance agreements being signed.

State average cost (unit cost) for these practices is based on Oklahoma NRCS data. In order for a variance to be considered the request must be in writing and accompanied by supporting data compiled by the conservation district. The variance rate must be approved by the Conservation Commission prior to performance agreements being signed.

Below are the conservation practices approved for Program Year 21.

327 - Conservation Cover

Definition: Establishing and maintain permanent vegetative cover.

Purpose:

- Reduce sheet, rill, and wind erosion and sedimentation.
- Reduce ground and surface water quality degradation by nutrients and surface water quality degradation by sediment.
- Reduce emissions of particulate matter (PM), PM precursors, and greenhouse gases.
- Enhance wildlife, pollinator, and beneficial organism habitat.
- Improve soil health.

328 – Conservation Crop Rotation

Definition: A planned sequence of crops grown on the same ground over a period of time (i.e. the rotation cycle).

Purpose:

- Reduce sheet, rill, and wind erosion.
- Maintain or increase soil health and organic matter content.
- Reduce water quality degradation due to excess nutrients.
- Improve soil moisture efficiency.
- Reduce the concentration of salts and other chemicals from saline seeps.
- Reduce plant pest pressures.
- Provide feed and forage for domestic livestock.
- Provide food and cover habitat for wildlife, including pollinator forage, and nesting.

329 - Residue and Tillage Management, No Till

Definition: Limiting soil disturbance to manage the amount, orientation and distribution of crop and plant residue on the soil surface year around.

Purpose:

- Reduce sheet, rill and wind erosion and excessive sediment in surface waters.
- Reduce tillage-induced particulate emissions.
- Maintain or increase soil health and organic matter content.
- Increase plant-available moisture.
- Reduce energy use.
- Provide food and escape cover for wildlife.

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338 - Prescribed Burning

Definition: Controlled fire applied to a predetermined area.

Purpose:

- Control undesirable vegetation.
- Prepare sites for harvesting, planting or seeding.
- Control plant disease.
- Reduce wildfire hazards.
- Improve wildlife habitat.
- Improve plant production quantity and/or quality.
- Remove slash and debris.
- Enhance seed and seedling production.
- Facilitate distribution of grazing and browsing animals.
- Restore and maintain ecological sites.

340 - Cover Crop

Definition: Grasses, legumes, and forbs planted for seasonal vegetative cover.

Purpose:

- Reduce erosion from wind and water.
- Maintain or increase soil health and organic matter content.
- Reduce water quality degradation by utilizing excessive soil nutrients.
- Suppress excessive weed pressures and break pest cycles.
- Improve soil moisture use efficiency.
- Minimize soil compaction.

393 – Filter Strip

Definition: A strip or area of herbaceous vegetation that removes contaminants from overland flow.

Purpose:

- Reduce suspended solids and associated contaminants in runoff and excessive sediment in surface waters.
- Reduce dissolved contaminant loadings in runoff.
- Reduce suspended solids and associated contaminants in irrigation tailwater and excessive sediment in surface waters.

528 - Prescribed Grazing

Definition: The controlled harvest of vegetation with grazing animals, managed with the intent to achieve a specific objective.

Purpose:

- Improve water infiltration.
- Maintain or improve riparian and upland area vegetation.
- Protect stream banks from erosion.
- Manage for deposition of fecal material way from water bodies.
- Promote ecological and economically stable plant communities which meet landowner objectives.

550 - Range Planting

Definition: Establishing of adapted perennial or self-sustaining vegetation such as grasses, forbs, legumes, shrubs and trees.

Purpose:

- Restore a plant community similar to the ecological site description reference state for the site or the desired plant community.
- Provide or improve forages for livestock.

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- Provide or improve forage, browse or cover for wildlife.
- Reduce erosion by wind and/or water.
- Improve water quality and quantity.
- Increase carbon sequestration.

590 – Nutrient Management

Definition: Managing the amount (rate), source, placement (method of application), and timing of plant nutrients and soil amendments.

Purpose:

- To budget, supply, and conserve nutrients for plant production. To minimize agricultural nonpoint source pollution of surface and groundwater resources.
- To properly utilize manure or organic byproducts as a plant nutrient source.
- To protect air quality by reducing odors, nitrogen emissions (ammonia, oxides of nitrogen), and the formation of atmospheric particulates.
- To maintain or improve the physical, chemical, and biological condition of soil.

595 – Integrated Pest Management

Definition: A site-specific combination of pest prevention, pest avoidance, pest monitoring, and pest suppression strategies.

Purpose:

- Prevent or mitigate off-site pesticide risks to water quality from leaching, solution runoff and adsorbed runoff losses.
- Prevent or mitigate off-site pesticide risks to soil, water, air, plants, animals and humans from drift and volatilization losses.
- Prevent or mitigate on-site pesticide risks to pollinators and other beneficial species through direct contact.
- Prevent or mitigate cultural, mechanical and biological pest suppression risks to soil, water, air, plants, animals and humans.

The month of July has been productive for the Association. Most notably, we were happy to assist the National Association of Conservation Districts by hosting the South Central Region Meeting July 21-23rd in Thackerville, OK. There were 122 registrants for the meeting. The 2.5 day event had many speakers on important programs and projects in Oklahoma including pollinator habitat, soil health, and water quality. There was also an excellent half day tour that culminated with dinner at the Chickasaw Cultural Center with guest speaker, Governor Bill Anoatubby. Thank you to the Commission and partners that all pitched in to make the meeting a success for Oklahoma.

We are very excited that we will begin receiving funds from the Nature Conservancy for the pollinator project. The Association has been notified that \$50,000 is available for Quarter 3 of 2019. It is our intent to use these funds to purchase no-till drills for districts to use. We hope this is just the first part of the total funding that will be available through this partnership. The Association is grateful for the Commission's assistance and expertise as we develop this program.

he Association was glad to work with the Commission on the submission of a Conservation Innovation Grant entitled "The Illinois River Watershed Poultry Producer Project" that focuses on improving water quality in Eastern Oklahoma.

The Association is currently working with the Commission on submitting a grant on August 16th to the Nature Conservancy for the Soil Health Citizen Scientist project.

Nearly 700 4-H and FFA students and over 200 coaches from more than 34 states, gathered in Oklahoma for the 68th National Land and Range Judging Contest, May 2, 2019. After two days of practice at sites in the Oklahoma City area, the contest was held near El Reno, Oklahoma at the Cheyenne Arapaho Tribal Headquarters. National championship trophies were awarded at the National Cowboy & Western Heritage Museum to team and individual winners in each category of competition: land judging, range judging and homesite evaluation. Each category included FFA and 4-H awards.

The soil types and the ranges of Oklahoma have been a challenge and a blessing to many generations of agricultural producers. Matt Lohr, Chief of the United States Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Natural Resources Conservation Service, (NRCS) in speaking to the contestants of the 68th National Land and Range Judging Contest on May 2 at the National Cowboy & Western Heritage Museum, said that in a lot ways the same can be true for them. They faced challenges during the contest, but now they can turn those challenges into positives for themselves and their communities.

FPAC agencies implement programs designed to mitigate the significant risks of farming through crop insurance services, conservation programs and technical assistance, and commodity, lending, and disaster programs.



Oklahoma numbers add up in conservation's favor in 2017 U.S. Census of Agriculture



The 2017 U.S. Census of Agriculture – released by the United States Department of Agriculture's (USDA) National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) – showed that in Oklahoma, compared to 2012, there was a 24 percent increase in the number of farms using cover crops, a 51 percent increase in acres using cover crops, and a 29 percent decrease in intensive tillage practices. On a national scale, the report shows that Oklahoma is seventh in the nation for the largest decrease in cropland acreage using conventional tillage practices. O'Neill said, "Reduced tillage and cover crops are two of the primary principles of Soil Health systems. These data trends show that Oklahoma farmers and ranchers are recognizing the benefits from implementing Soil. Health Systems on their lands."

Stilwell NRCS partner yearly with 4-H and OSU Cooperative Extension at this event to help shape bright young minds in our community and raise awareness of our conservation efforts in the community. Robert and Ashley judged speeches about crafts such as making slime, building birdhouses, and pet



grooming. Josh judged speeches about food recipes, such as unicorn shakes, Chex mix, and Better than a boyfriend brownies. The students were brave, entertaining, and informative.

Soil Health Workshop

The Watonga NRCS FO in conjunction with OTCAC, the Blaine County CD, and the Central North Canadian River CD held a Soil Health Workshop and Locally Led Meeting at the Blaine County Fairgrounds on April 16, 2019. Other agencies and partners present



were the Black Historical Society, NASS, FSA, and USDA Climate Hub. Speakers included Dr. Carol Crouch, P.J. Martin, Steve Alspach, and Colin Walden with the NRCS, Trista Costa with the FSA, Clay Pope with the USDA Climate Hub, Troy Marshall with NASS, Debi Carnot with OACD and CNCRCD, and Steve House with the BCCD. Topics included soil health on cropland and soil health principles, and grazing land management for soil health. There were 30 people in attendance and the content of the workshop was well received.

And then there was May 2019

Tornadoes and flooding battled it out for Oklahoma's top weather headline during May 2019, with both combatants bringing mayhem and misery to the state. The scope and scale of the weather disasters prompted Gov. Kevin Stitt to declare a State of Emergency for all 77 counties. According to reports from the Oklahoma Department of Emergency Management, at least six fatalities and 118 injuries were attributed to the flooding and severe weather. Flooding was the most widespread and damaging of the weather hazards during May. According to preliminary data from the Oklahoma Mesonet, the statewide average rainfall total was 10.48 inches, 5.66 inches above normal. North central Oklahoma's average of 12.2 inches was 7.84 inches above normal, ranking it as the wettest calendar month on record for that part of the state. The National Weather Service cooperative observer site at Pawnee led the state with 22.52 inches,

The report detailed over \$30 million in monetary benefits resulting from the watershed projects in Oklahoma in May 2019.

Fairview Chamber of Commerce's Luncheon



The Major County Conservation District, NRCS and FSA partnered to participate in the Fairview Chamber of Commerce's Professional, Business & Industry Luncheon on April 23, 2019 in Fairview, OK. There were approximately 200 in attendance and we presented Farm Bill Program Fact Sheets, Soil Health Resources, Garden / Cover Crop Seed, State Cost Share Program Information and other conservation related pamphlets. There were several good conservation conversations including discussion of building Soil Health resulting in follow-up field appointments.

Natural Resources Day

On May the 6th, the Murray County Conservation District held their Natural Resource Day at the Murray County Expo Center. Attending were 190 students from Sulphur and Davis, along with 10 teachers. The presenters were the Sulphur Fire Department, the Pauls Valley NRCS, Oklahoma Blue Thumb, the Oklahoma Conservation Commission, the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation, the National Fish Hatchery, the OSU Extension service, the Chickasaw National Recreation Area, and the Murray County 4-H.

The Conservation District Employee training, made possible by the Oklahoma Conservation Commission (OCC), the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), the Oklahoma Association of Conservation Districts (OACD) and the OACD Employees, included topics such as Oklahoma's state funded locally-led conservation cost-share program, director elections and appointments, basic financial management, soil health and other education resources, surplus and sale of equipment and property, pesticide applicator Continuing Education Unit (CEU) Training and several other items.

NRCS State Conservationist Gary O'Neill, said, "NRCS and Conservation District employees work side-by-side in providing assistance to Oklahoma farmers and ranchers. The more training each of our staffs receive the more efficient and better we are equipped to provide a high-level of customer service. This helps both NRCS and the Conservation Districts achieve our critically important conservation mission."

Youth Fishing Clinic at Northeast Tech Afton Campus

Shirley Hudson and Madison Taylor attended the Youth Fishing Clinic at Northeast Tech Afton Campus on Friday June 7, 2019. This event was a partnership between Northeast Tech, Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation, and the Ottawa County Conservation District to educate youth about local fish and basic fishing practices.







NRCS Oklahoma Listening Sessions



NRCS Oklahoma held listening sessions on April 10 in Shawnee and April 15 in Miami to discuss the 2018 Farm Bill. Participants included NRCS State Conservationist Gary O'Neill, NRCS State Tribal Liaison Dr. Carol Crouch, Risk Management Agency Director James Bellimon and Farm Service Agency State Executive Director Scott Biggs. Other USDA agencies joining

the listening sessions included the National Agricultural Statistics Service, Rural Development and Food Nutrition Service. On April 15, NRCS and the Qupaw Nation signed a soil health agreement to promote healthy soil on Quapaw Nation tribal trust land. O'Neill and Chairman John Berrey, Quapaw Nation, signed the document.



Conservation's message carried by many on Conservation Day at the Capitol


"Conservation Day at the Capitol" is an event where conservation district directors, cooperators, and employees are encouraged to share with legislators the important services that conservation districts provide to the community in the area of natural resources conservation. It also provides an opportunity to recognize those who lead conservation's efforts with their passion and their actions throughout Oklahoma.

The Oklahoma Association of Conservation Districts announced Seth Stone, Chandler, and Hunter Jordan, Jet, as the 2019 Mike Thralls Memorial Scholarship award winners. Stone is 1st in his class at Chandler High School and will attend Oklahoma State University in the fall. Jordan is a junior at Oklahoma State University and is majoring in Animal Science.

The Ottawa County Conservation District received the Outstanding Conservation District award. The district works with over 10,000 cooperators to preserve the natural resources of their community. Larry Wright from the Deer Creek Conservation District was presented with the Outstanding Conservation District Director award. Wright raises organic, specialty crops. He works tirelessly to help educate youth, farmers & ranchers, and elected officials about the importance of conservation. The Outstanding Conservation District Director award is sponsored by the Noble Research Institute and OACD.
