## **NEW BUSINESS**

Mr. Lam stated that on Friday, July 31, after the meeting agenda had been posted, he received a request for approval of an agreement with four conservation districts who will be partnering with Oklahoma State University for on-farm demonstrations as listed in Attachment A. He recommended approval of the agreement. A motion was made by Mr. Clark and seconded by Ms. LeGrand to approve the agreement as presented. ## **CONSERVATION PARTNERSHIP REPORTS**

*Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry:* Blayne Arthur, Deputy Commissioner, introduced Bryan Painter as the new Administration Director for the Department and Gatlin Squires, the OSU Summer Intern. Ms. Arthur stated that the director of the Ag Lab, Paul Kerr, has resigned and Tana Kilpatrick has been named interim director.

Ms. Arthur advised that a Pollinator Plan meeting is scheduled for August 11 at the Langston University Oklahoma City Campus. The Animal Industry Division is doing high path exercises for Avian Influenza in the event the disease gets to Oklahoma. The State Vet is working with the Office of Homeland Security and the Office of Emergency Management.

Ms. Arthur stated that the Market Development Division hosted an in-bound trade mission with Made In Oklahoma vendors and reported it was a success.

Mr. Jett questioned steps regarding musk thistle complaints and levied fines by the Department. Ms. Arthur stated that the Department has protocols for such complaints.

*USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service:* Gary O'Neill, State Conservationist, provided copies of a quarterly written report. The Environmental Quality Incentive Program has \$14 million obligated in contracts. The Emergency Watershed Program received \$4.4 million. This includes 27 watershed dams with damage totaling \$2.6 million. The Emergency Conservation Program, administered by the Farm Service Agency, is available in twenty counties. The NRCS does provide technical assistance for the program.

Mr. O'Neill stated that Kevin Wickey, NRCS regional conservationist, will be attending the NACD South Central Meeting in Tulsa next week.

*Oklahoma Association of Conservation Districts:* Steve House, President, reported on an NACD meeting he attended in Spokane, Washington. He then expressed his appreciation to the

Commission and staff for work on the upcoming NACD South Central Region meeting. Mr. House stated that area meetings will be discussed during the next OACD board meeting.

#### **OKLAHOMA CONSERVATION COMMISSION MEMBERS**

Mr. Clark said that things are getting back to normal after heavy rains earlier in the summer.

Ms. LeGrand has been assisting district directors and employees in her area.

Mr. Jett reported on attending the Turkey Creek legislative day on July 17 and stated it was a successful day. He commended Drummond schools on its outstanding FFA program.

#### **OKLAHOMA CONSERVATION COMMISSION STAFF**

*Executive Director:* Mr. Lam stated that a written report is in the meeting packet. He reported that the final three water quality tours, in Oklahoma City, Enid and Spiro, were very successful.

Mr. Lam has been working with OACD on finalizing plans for the upcoming NACD South Central Region meeting. There are over 150 registrants.

Mr. Lam reported on the first meeting of the district staffing committee which is looking at shortages of funds. He stated that the majority of general revenue funds received at the Commission go to fund districts' staff. Mr. Lam said that the Central North Canadian River and the Blaine County Conservation Districts will be sharing a district secretary. Mr. Lam has been working with Ms. LeGrand and districts in that area on how to handle the workload of over 500 watershed structures. He stated that this is not a move to consolidate districts but is a move to keep them from having to be consolidated. Mr. Lam stated that the Noble County Conservation District employee works across district lines to assist other districts.

*Water Quality Program:* Shanon Phillips, Director, stated a written report is in the packet. She then provided copies of three success stories that were just approved by the Environmental Protection Agency (see Attachment B).

Ms. Phillips asked attendees to pray for water quality employee Jill Ashbrener and her family as her dad was injured in a head-on collision.

Ms. Phillips stated that work continues on summer collections as well as education programs.

*Office of Geographic Information and Technical Services:* Mike Sharp, Director, stated a written report is in the packet. He was questioned about the status of the Taloga marijuana eradication project and stated it was on hold.

*Abandoned Mine Land Reclamation Program:* Robert Toole, Director, stated a written report is in the packet. He reported that the Bauman Project is complete and the prebid for the Reves Project is underway.

Mr. Toole then reported on surveys required for the American Burying Beetle as well as the Long Eared Bat before any work can begin on AML projects.

*Conservation Programs:* Tammy Sawatzky, Director, stated a written report is in the packet and she yielded for questions.

*Assistant Director:* Ms. Owen stated that the Pittsburg County and Garvin Conservation District offices are being relocated temporarily due to building issues.

Ms. Owen stated that Louisiana State Conservationist Kevin Norton, also a former Oklahoma NRCS employee, wrote a report on the importance of Oklahoma's flood control structures to Louisiana. She also reported that water quality employee Trampas Tripp was featured on Tulsa's Channel 6 recently for capturing a photo of about twenty elk crossing the Illinois River.

Ms. Owen reported that consolidation work continues with Valliant Conservation District and she will be attending a board meeting there this week.

The Commission will be receiving additional funds from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for no-till drills and prescribed fires.

Ms. Owen made a presentation on a webinar regarding conservation funding hosted by the National Association of State Conservation Agencies.

The next regular meeting of the Oklahoma Conservation Commission will be held on Tuesday, September 1, 2015, in the Agriculture Building Board Room, 2800 N. Lincoln Boulevard, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma beginning at 9:30 a.m.

# Oklahoma

## Conservation Practices Result in Improved Bacteria Levels in Walnut Creek

### Waterbody Improved

Walnut Creek was impaired for *Escherichia coli* (*E. coli*) bacteria and was added to Oklahoma's Clean Water Act (CWA) section 303(d) list of impaired waters in 2006. Due in part to practices associated with cattle and hog production, the impairment was addressed through implementation of a system of conservation practices (CPs) that focused on improving grazingland and excluding livestock from riparian areas. This effort led to a sustained decrease in bacteria in the creek, resulting in removal of Walnut Creek for *E. coli* impairment from Oklahoma's CWA section 303(d) list in 2014.

### Problem

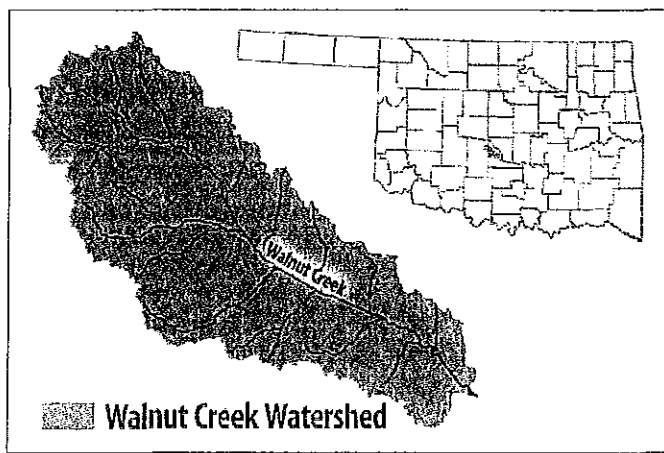


Figure 1. The Walnut Creek watershed flows through McClain County in central Oklahoma.

Twenty-eight-mile-long Walnut Creek (OK520610030010\_00) flows through McClain County in central Oklahoma (Figure 1). The majority of the land in the 129,852-acre watershed is used for wheat and cattle production. Many hogs are also produced, in addition to corn, sorghum and soybeans. Erosion of both cropland and grazingland, coupled with improper management of livestock wastes and direct livestock access to streams, were potentially the largest nonpoint source (NPS) problems in the watershed, contributing to high levels of fecal bacteria in the stream. In the 2006 water quality assessment, *E. coli* bacteria levels exceeded the state criterion, with a geometric mean of 179 colony forming units/100 milliliters (CFU). The primary body contact recreation designated use is considered impaired if the geometric mean exceeds 126 CFU for *E. coli*.

### Project Highlights

Landowners implemented numerous CPs with support from Oklahoma Conservation Commission's (OCC's) Locally Led Cost Share (LLCS) program and funds from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) general technical assistance programs and the Environmental Quality Incentives Program. The focus of most CPs in this watershed was proper grazing management, including fencing livestock out of streams, and improved pasture and rangeland quality, as runoff from poor quality land can carry both sediment and fecal bacteria into waterbodies.

From 2009 to 2012, landowners installed 30,619 linear feet of fence and implemented

10,837 acres of prescribed grazing. Sixteen new ponds provided alternative water supplies for livestock after cross-fencing to optimize grazingland usage. Landowners also cooperated in nutrient management planning on nearly 9,000 acres. Brush management on more than 1,200 acres helped improve pasture and range quality, as did 1,500 acres of supplemental biomass and critical area planting and 7,330 acres of pest management. Cover crops increased the soil health of more than 1,800 acres of pasture and range, and no-till or reduced till methods were used in these areas. To reduce erosion from sloped areas, producers installed grassed waterways, terraces, diversions and grade stabilization structures. Upland wildlife habitat management practices were implemented on 149 acres, and stream habitat improvement and management CPs were conducted over 89 acres.

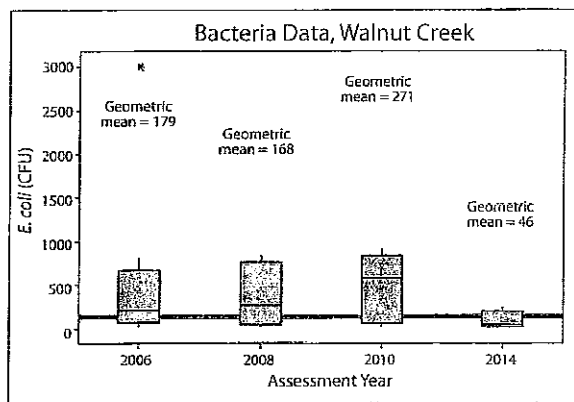


Figure 2. Boxplots indicate the interquartile range (25th-75th percentile) and median of the data for assessment years 2006, 2008, 2010 and 2014. A stream meets criteria for *E. coli* if the geometric mean, based on no more than five years of data preceding the assessment year, is less than 126 colony forming units/100 mL (CFU).

Oklahoma's NPS education program, Blue Thumb, held several volunteer monitoring trainings in the area. A local high school teacher and her students monitored Walnut Creek for a year, and another group of citizens collected water quality, benthic macroinvertebrates and fish data for two years.

Landowners installed additional CPs from 2013 through 2014 that have enhanced the initial improvements. CPs included prescribed grazing management (4,570 acres), nutrient management (159 acres), grazing management (4,122 acres), supplemental vegetation planting (285 acres) and fencing practices (3,700 linear feet).

## Results

The OCC's statewide NPS ambient monitoring program documented improved water quality in Walnut Creek due to conservation efforts (Figures 2 and 3). The installed grazingland and nutrient management CPs worked to decrease erosion and reduce bacteria loading. CPs designed to improve pasture and rangeland resulted in denser vegetation and fewer bare spots, which reduced runoff of soil, nutrients and bacteria from animal wastes into waterbodies. In the 2014 assessment, monitoring data showed that the geometric mean of *E. coli* had decreased to 46 CFU, which is significantly below the state standard of

126 CFU. Hence, Walnut Creek was removed for *E. coli* impairment from the 2014 CWA section 303(d) list and is in partial attainment of the primary body contact recreation use. With continued good management, the waterbody is expected to fully attain its primary recreation designated use.

## Partners and Funding

The improvement in water quality in Walnut Creek was documented by OCC's statewide NPS ambient monitoring effort known as the Rotating Basin Monitoring Program (RBMP). The RBMP is funded in part with U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) CWA section 319 funds at a total annual cost of \$1 million. This funding supports personnel, supplies, lab analyses and other associated costs. Sampling efforts comprise 20 water quality collections at approximately 100 sites every five weeks per five-year cycle. Instream habitat, fish and macroinvertebrate samples are also collected during this period. Statewide educational efforts through OCC's Blue Thumb Program are also funded by EPA section 319 at a cost of approximately \$600,000 annually. These funds support costs associated with volunteer monitoring at nearly 100 sites, volunteer trainings and many outreach activities. The OCC LLCs program provided \$60,000 in state funding for CP implementation in this watershed through the McClain Conservation District with landowners contributing \$43,148 in match. The NRCS spent a little over \$1 million through its financial assistance programs for CP implementation in McClain County from 2009 through 2012 (pre-delisting period). Implementation is still ongoing, with NRCS spending an additional \$500,000 since 2013.

# Oklahoma

## Implementing Agricultural Conservation Practices Improves Dissolved Oxygen, Turbidity and Bacteria Levels in Pond Creek

### Waterbody Improved

High turbidity, bacteria and low dissolved oxygen resulted in the impairment of Pond Creek and placement on Oklahoma's

Clean Water Act (CWA) section 303(d) list of impaired waters in 2004 and subsequent years. Corn, wheat and cattle production contributed to these impairments, and implementation of a system of conservation practices (CPs) to promote better quality grazingland and cropland decreased sediment and bacteria loading into the creek and improved dissolved oxygen levels. As a result, the entire length of Pond Creek was removed from Oklahoma's 2010 CWA 303(d) list for turbidity and dissolved oxygen impairments and from the 2014 list for *Escherichia coli* (*E. coli*) impairment. Pond Creek is now in full attainment of its fish and wildlife propagation designated use and in partial attainment of its primary body contact recreation use.

### Problem

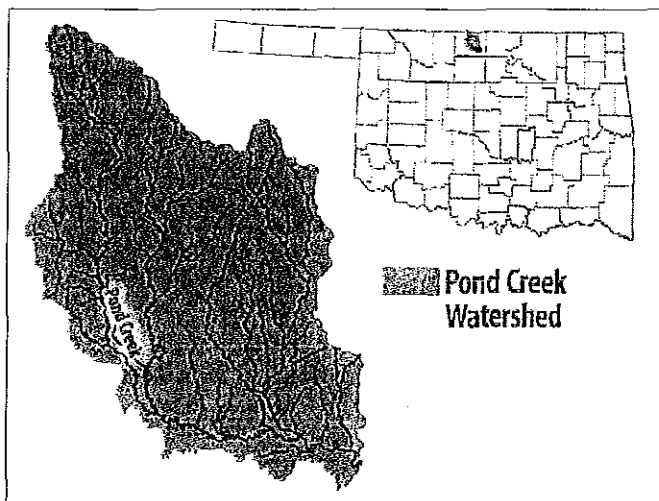


Figure 1. Pond Creek is in Grant County in northern Oklahoma.

Pond Creek is a 60-mile-long stream in Grant County in north central Oklahoma (Figure 1). Land use in the 198,000-acre watershed is primarily cultivated cropland with corn, wheat, sorghum and soybean production. About a third of the watershed is pasture for cattle production.

Poor grazingland and cropland management contributed to excess sedimentation, high levels of bacteria and low dissolved oxygen in Pond Creek. It was listed as impaired for *E. coli* bacteria in 2004 when the geometric mean was 162 colony forming units/100 milliliters (CFU), higher than the criterion of 126 CFU. In the 2006 water quality assessment, monitoring showed that 50 percent of Pond Creek's seasonal baseflow water samples exceeded 50 nephelometric turbidity units (NTU). A stream is considered impaired by turbidity if more than 10 percent of the seasonal base flow water samples exceed 50 NTU (based on five years of data before the assessment year). In addition, 14 percent of dissolved oxygen values in the 2006 assessment were below the seasonal criteria for warm water aquatic communities; impairment results if more than 10 percent of samples (based on five years of data before the assessment year) fall below 6.0 milligrams per liter (mg/L) from April 1 through June 15 or below 5.0 mg/L during the remainder of the year. On the basis of these assessment results, Oklahoma added the entire length of Pond Creek (OK621000050010 \_ 00) to the 2004 CWA section 303(d) list for nonattainment of the primary body contact recreation designated use, and to the 2006 303(d) list for nonattainment of the fish and

wildlife propagation designated use due to turbidity and dissolved oxygen impairments. In 2011 Oklahoma completed TMDLs for turbidity and bacteria.

### Project Highlights

Landowners implemented CPs with assistance from Oklahoma's Locally Led Cost Share (LLCP) program and through the local U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP), Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), Wetlands Reserve Program (WRP), Conservation

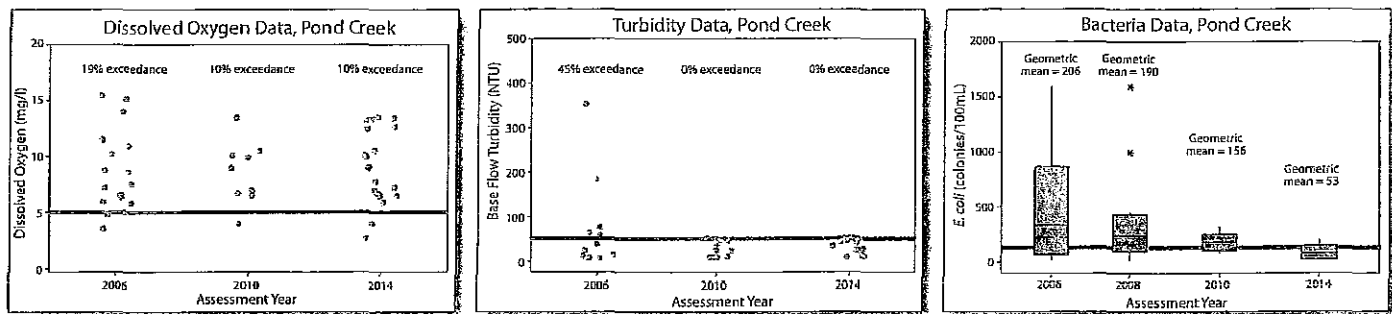


Figure 2. Monitoring data indicate that dissolved oxygen levels and base flow turbidity levels in Pond Creek have met water quality criteria since 2010. Levels of *E. coli* have steadily declined since 2006, and met the criterion in 2014.

Stewardship Program (CSP), and general conservation technical assistance program. From 2005 to 2009, landowners improved many acres of pastures and rangeland, which reduced runoff of bacteria, nutrients and sediment. CPs installed to accomplish this improvement included 9,226 acres of prescribed grazing, 327 acres of forage planting, 911 acres of nutrient management, 1,732 acres of integrated pest management, 565 acres of brush management, 15 ponds, 8,770 feet of pipeline, eight water tanks for alternative water sources and 16,474 acres of upland wildlife habitat management.

To reduce erosion of soil and the runoff of nutrients from cropland, landowners also implemented conservation cover crops on 3,774 acres and no-till/reduced till/mulch till/residue management on 4,069 acres. Range planting occurred on 6,765 acres, which helps stabilize soils by converting croplands or degraded range to perennial vegetation. Contour farming was implemented on 685 acres, which included more than 75,000 linear feet of terraces, and more than 140 acres of critical area planting and grassed waterways. Three acres of filter strips and two grade stabilization structures further reduced erosion potential from croplands. Proper nutrient management on 9,755 acres and integrated pest management on 13,936 acres improved cropland condition and reduced excess nutrient runoff and erosion. Through the CRP, landowners restored 2,175 acres of "rare and declining habitat" that had been cropland and enrolled 16,474 acres into "upland wildlife habitat management." In addition, 100 acres had wetland restoration and enhancement. These practices return degraded land to a more natural, less-erosive state.

Conservation work continues in the watershed. Since 2010, an additional 40,049 acres of cropland have no-till, reduced till, cover crop and conservation crop rotations. Landowners installed seven more grade stabilization structures, 71,796 linear feet of terraces,

79 acres of grassed waterways, and 21 new ponds, and implemented prescribed grazing on 9,864 acres of pasture and range.

## Results

Through its statewide nonpoint source ambient monitoring program, the OCC documented improved water quality in Pond Creek due to landowners implementing CPs. Data showed that turbidity and dissolved oxygen have met applicable criteria since 2010, and *E. coli* met criterion in 2014 (Figure 2). On the basis of these data, Pond Creek was removed from Oklahoma's CWA section 303(d) list for turbidity and dissolved oxygen impairments in 2010, resulting in the full attainment of its fish and wildlife propagation designated use. Pond Creek's *E. coli* impairment was removed in 2014.

## Partners and Funding

The Rotating Basin Monitoring Program is supported by EPA CWA section 319 funds at an average annual cost of \$1 million. Monitoring costs include personnel, supplies and lab analyses for 18 parameters from samples collected every five weeks at about 100 sites, for a total of 20 episodes per five-year cycle. Instream habitat, fish and macroinvertebrate samples are also collected. Approximately \$600,000 in EPA CWA section 319 supports statewide education, outreach and monitoring efforts through the Blue Thumb program. The OCC LLCs program provided \$158,833 in state funding for CPs in this watershed through the Grant County Conservation District, and landowners contributed \$76,256 in match. NRCS spent approximately \$1.23 million for implementation of CPs in Grant County from 2005 to 2009 through NRCS EQIP, CSP, WRP, CRP and general technical assistance funds, and another \$2.74 million from 2010 to 2014. Landowners provided a significant percentage of funding toward CP implementation in these programs as well.

# Oklahoma

## Implementation of Conservation Practices Improves Bacteria Levels in Commission Creek

**Waterbody Improved** High levels of *Escherichia coli* (*E. coli*) bacteria, caused in part by cattle production, led to Commission Creek being added to Oklahoma's 2002 Clean Water Act (CWA) section 303(d) list of impaired waters. Implementing a system of conservation practices (CPs) to improve grazingland and exclude livestock from riparian areas resulted in decreased bacteria in the creek. As a result, Commission Creek was removed from Oklahoma's 2008 CWA section 303(d) list for *E. coli* impairment and is in partial attainment of its primary body contact recreation designated use.

### Problem

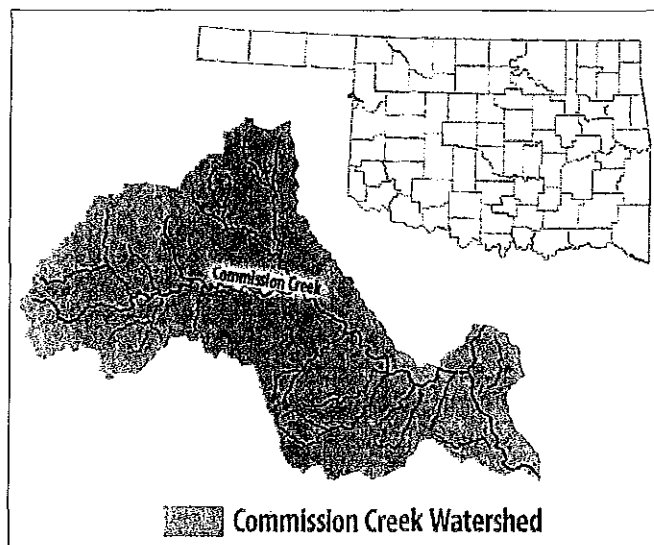


Figure 1. The Commission Creek watershed flows through Ellis County in western Oklahoma.

Twelve mile long Commission Creek (OK520620050160 \_ 00) flows through Ellis County on the western Oklahoma border with Texas (Figure 1). The majority of the land in the 31,543-acre area is used for wheat and cattle production. A small amount of cotton and sorghum is also produced. Erosion of grazingland, coupled with improper management of livestock wastes and direct livestock access to streams, was potentially the largest nonpoint source (NPS) problem in the watershed, contributing to high levels of fecal bacteria in the stream. In the 2002 water quality assessment, *E. coli* levels exceeded the state criterion, with a geometric mean of 146 colony forming units/100 milliliters (CFU). The primary body contact recreation designated use is considered impaired if the geometric mean exceeds 126 CFU for *E. coli*. A TMDL for *E. coli* and *Enterococcus* was implemented by Oklahoma in 2006.

### Project Highlights

Landowners implemented CPs with support from the Oklahoma Conservation Commission's (OCC's) Locally Led Cost Share Program (LLCS), and funds from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) Environmental Quality Incentives Program, Conservation Reserve Program and Wildlife Habitat Incentive Program. The focus of most CPs in this watershed was to improve rangeland quality and restore natural habitat. Improved water quality was expected from decreased runoff from poor quality land that can carry both sediment and fecal bacteria

into waterbodies. From 2006 to 2014, landowners installed eight alternative water supplies and implemented 2,784 acres of prescribed grazing. Brush management on 660 acres also helped improve range quality. In addition, upland wildlife habitat management occurred on 2,466 acres, which produced high quality, diverse, natural vegetation which is less susceptible to erosion.

The OCC NPS education program, Blue Thumb, had an active presence in Ellis County from 2004 to 2010. In 2002, staff from the Ellis County Conservation

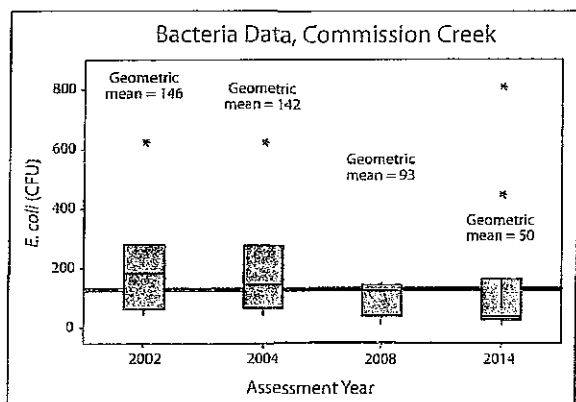


Figure 2. Boxplots indicate the interquartile range (25th-75th percentile) and median of the data for assessment years 2002, 2004, 2008 and 2014. A stream meets criteria for *E. coli* if the geometric mean, based on no more than five years of data preceding the assessment year, is less than 126 colony forming units/100 mL (CFU).

District and local NRCS participated in a Blue Thumb training session. In addition, a local high school teacher and her students monitored a stream in the county and submitted reports on the results to the local newspaper to inform local citizens about potential problems and options to improve water quality. The high school students participated in an annual training about NPS pollution and used an Envirosearch watershed model to teach younger students about NPS dynamics and solutions.

## Results

The OCC Rotating Basin Monitoring Program, a statewide nonpoint source ambient monitoring program, documented improved water quality in Commission Creek due to the conservation efforts (Figure 2). The grazingland and nutrient management CPs decreased erosion and bacteria loading, and the CPs designed to improve rangeland and wildlife habitat resulted in denser vegetation and fewer bare spots, which equated to less runoff of soil, nutrients and bacteria from animal wastes into waterbodies. Monitoring data showed that the geometric mean of *E. coli* in the 2008 assessment was 93 CFU, below the state standard of 126 CFU. Hence, Commission Creek was removed from the 2008 CWA section 303(d) list for *E. coli* impairment. The geometric mean in the 2014

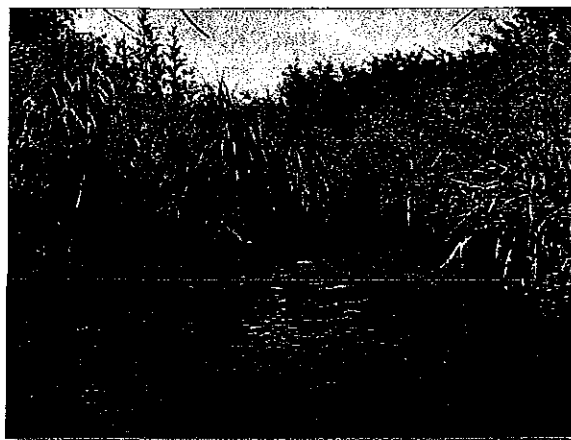


Figure 3. The OCC Rotating Basin Monitoring Program documented improved water quality in Commission Creek, seen here in 2015.

assessment was even lower, at 50 CFU, indicating that *E. coli* in Commission Creek has remained low, and the creek is in partial attainment of the primary body contact recreation use. With continued good management, the waterbody is expected to fully attain its primary recreation designated use.

## Partners and Funding

The improvement in water quality in Commission Creek was documented by OCC's statewide NPS ambient monitoring effort known as the Rotating Basin Monitoring Program (RBMP). The RBMP is funded in part with U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) CWA section 319 funds at a total annual cost of \$1 million. This funding supports personnel, supplies, lab analyses and other associated costs. Sampling efforts comprise 20 water quality collections at approximately 100 sites every five weeks per five-year cycle. Instream habitat, fish and macro-invertebrate samples are also collected during this period. Statewide educational efforts through OCC's Blue Thumb are also funded by EPA section 319 at a cost of approximately \$600,000 annually. The Ellis County Conservation District and landowners in the watershed contributed approximately \$5,000 through the LLCs program. NRCS spent a little over \$1 million through its programs for implementation of CPs in Ellis County from 2006 through 2014, and implementation continues in the area through various programs.

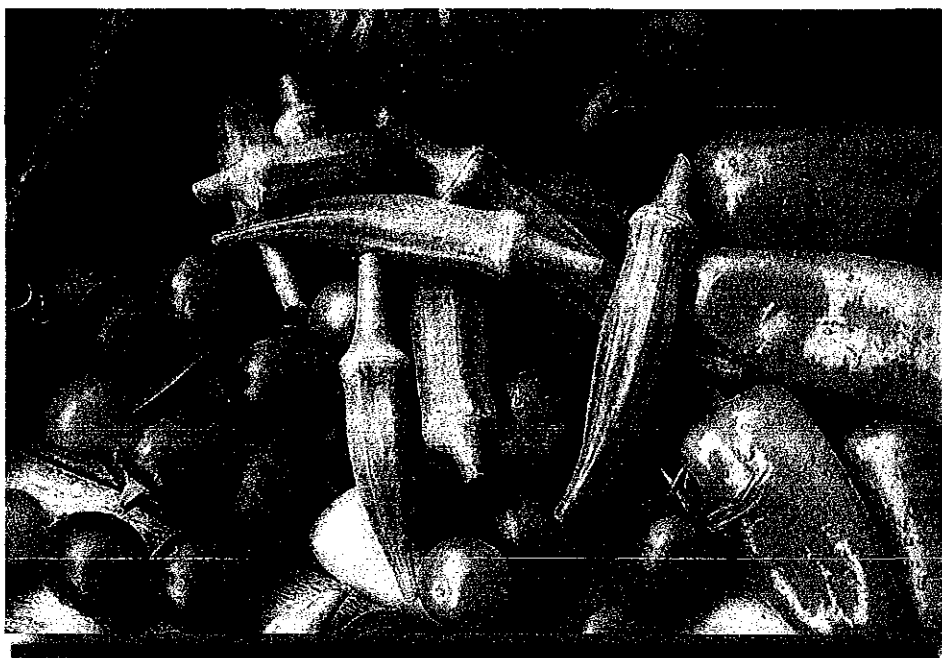
CONSERVATION ASSISTANCE IS JUST A **CLICK** AWAY

The **USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service** rolled out an online portal in May that could save farmers unnecessary trips to town and allow NRCS technicians more time in the field.

The new Conservation Client Gateway is a secure site that allows farmers and ranchers to:

- ⇒ Request NRCS technical and financial assistance
- ⇒ Review and sign conservation plans and practice schedules
- ⇒ Complete and sign an application for a conservation program
- ⇒ Review, sign and submit contracts and appendices for conservation programs
- ⇒ Document completed practices and request certification of completed practices
- ⇒ Request and track payments for conservation programs
- ⇒ Store and retrieve technical and financial files, including documents and photographs

ner said that he likes being able to contact his NRCS office in the evening. If he's doing field work during the day and finds a problem after an extreme weather event, he can go online later and ask "what might be available to fix one of those problems."

NRCS Chief Jason Weller said the website has a feature similar to Google Maps that allows farmers to zoom in on different tracts of land "to identify natural resource challenges you might want help with," including soil erosion and invasive weeds.

The site will work on a smart phone or tablet and in about a year a streamlined version of the Gateway will be available for phones.

Weller said users will need to have a Service Center Information Management System (SCIMS) record and a USDA Level 2 authentication account. That proves your identity to USDA.

"For the vast majority of our customers, they already have that established," Weller said.

When asked by Agriculture.com if the Gateway can be used to determine conservation compliance (which is administered by USDA's Farm Service Agency), Weller said, "At this time, no."

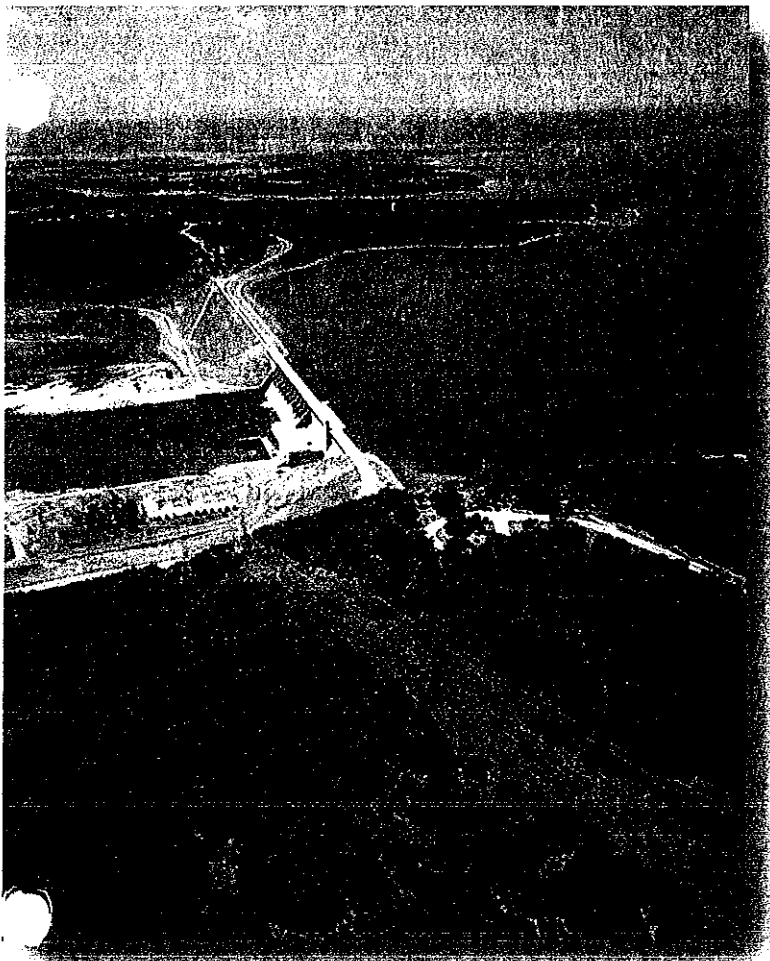
Nor is the portal set up for complex farming entities like limited liability companies. That will be available in about a year, he said. "It's only available for individuals," Weller said, or about 80% of the agency's clients.

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## **Unfunded dams could have saved millions in flood damage**

**Oklahoma dams typically save \$88 million in flood damage annually**



More than 300 unfunded dams are planned for Oklahoma, but haven't been built yet.

"We've identified areas where dams could be used to prevent damages and save lives," Oklahoma Conservation Commission representative Robert Hathorne said. "On average, it's about \$2 million a year to maintain the 2107 dams that we have and in exchange we are receiving millions and millions of dollars in damage that's not occurring."

The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service Water Resource Office said if the 331 planned dams had been in place, they would have prevented \$6.1 million in flood damage over the Memorial Day weekend alone.

Current flood control dams prevented \$96.3 million in flood damage to land, homes and businesses over the last couple months.

The USDA estimates an additional \$21.4 million could have been saved April 18 through May 25 if the unfunded dams had been built.

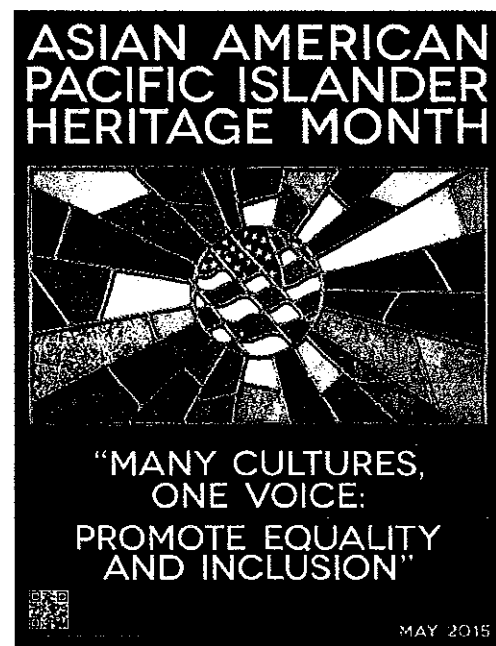

## **About Asian-Pacific American Heritage Month**

May is Asian-Pacific American Heritage Month – a celebration of Asians and Pacific Islanders in the United States. A rather broad term, Asian-Pacific encompasses all of the Asian continent and the Pacific islands of Melanesia (New Guinea, New Caledonia, Vanuatu, Fiji and the Solomon Islands), Micronesia (Marianas, Guam, Wake Island, Palau, Marshall Islands, Kiribati, Nauru and the Federated States of Micronesia) and Polynesia (New Zealand, Hawaiian Islands, Rotuma, Midway Islands, Samoa, American Samoa, Tonga, Tuvalu, Cook Islands, French Polynesia and Easter Island).

Like most commemorative months, Asian-Pacific Heritage Month originated in a congressional bill. In June 1977, Reps. Frank Horton of New York and Norman Y. Mineta of California introduced a House resolution that called upon the president to proclaim the first ten days of May as Asian-Pacific Heritage Week. The following month, senators Daniel Inouye and Spark Matsunaga introduced a similar bill in the Senate. Both were passed. On October 5, 1978, President Jimmy Carter signed a Joint Resolution designating the annual celebration. Twelve years later, President George H.W. Bush signed an extension making the week-long celebration into a month-long celebration. In 1992, the official designation of May as Asian-Pacific American Heritage Month was signed into law. The month of May was chosen to commemorate the immigration of the first Japanese to the United States on May 7, 1843, and to mark the anniversary of the completion of the transcontinental railroad on May 10, 1869. The majority of the workers who laid the tracks were Chinese immigrants.

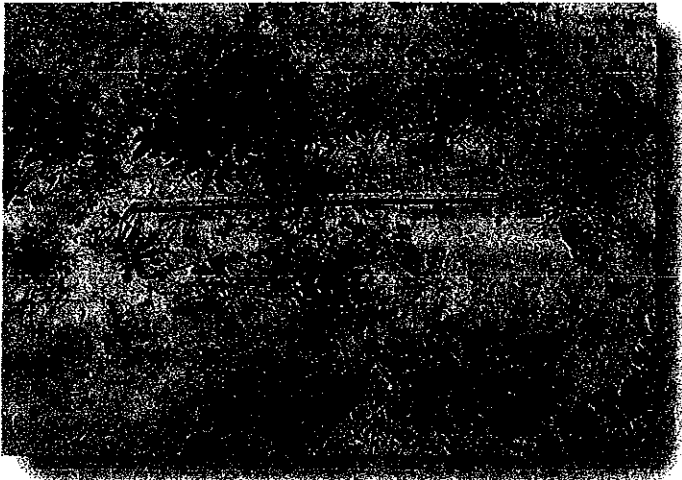


## Major County plants 1329 acres of grass this Spring through fiscal year 2015 EQIP funds

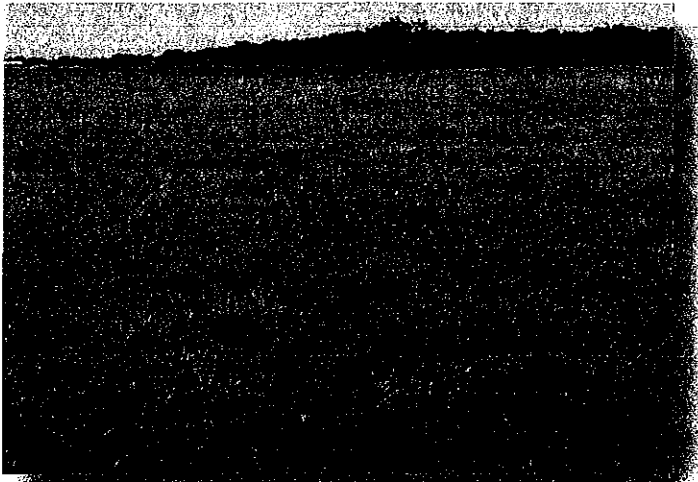

The Major County Conservation District and Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS)-Fairview Office, assisted local producers in planting 1329.9 acres of grass this Spring through fiscal year 2015 Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP) funds.

Major County producers were able to take advantage of the moisture provided this year to plant their grass, although it was very difficult at times to get into the field to plant the grass with the abundant moisture. Most of the crop fields contained highly erodible soils that now will be protected from wind and water erosion, and still be very productive for the operators in hay and/or grass for livestock production. Fields planted this year were planted to Bermuda grass or old world bluestem, an additional 220 acres were planned and contracted this year to plant to Bermuda grass, old world bluestem or native grass mixes. Through FY 2015 EQIP, we were able to assist our producers in permanently covering / protecting 1549.9 acres of soils from future erosion, protecting our streams, water and air quality while still being able to utilize and protect the Resource.

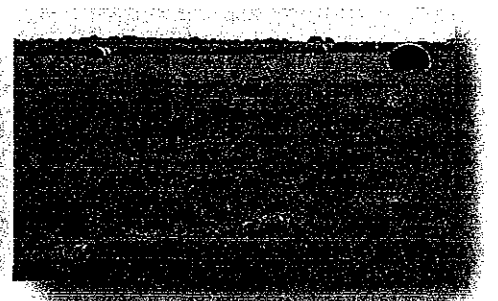
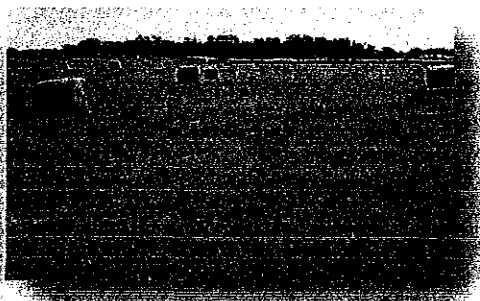
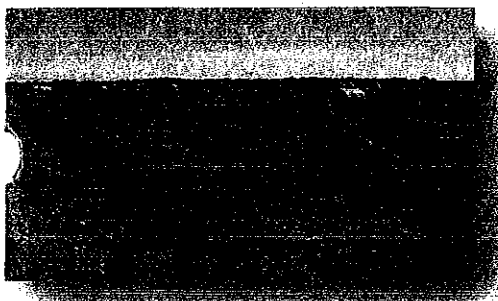

It is a privilege to be able to work with our producers, helping them accomplish their conservation and production goals while conserving, protecting and still using the resources we and they are entrusted with in a sustainable manner. These fields are HEL sandy soils sprigged in 2010 that yielded 6 tons / ac during the 2014 hay crop. In the past these corner acres around an irrigated circle might have been neglected and / or resulted in soil leaving the site during wind erosion events. Now look at them today!



## USDA StrikeForce Initiative - Oklahoma

Oklahoma has been added to the list of 21 states to be participating in the recently expanded United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) StrikeForce for Rural Growth and Opportunity Initiative. USDA's StrikeForce Initiative was established in 2010 to address specific challenges with persistent rural poverty. The initiative will provide additional Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) funds for 32 counties in Oklahoma, as well as provide economic benefit to these areas. Oklahoma Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), collaborators and partners have been focused on outreach efforts and assistance in accelerating the delivery of NRCS' available technical and financial assistance to farmers, ranchers and communities in these counties. StrikeForce funds will be allocated to counties with pre-approved applications to address existing National, State, and Local resource concerns for Fiscal Year (FY)2015. All practices available under regular EQIP are available in the StrikeForce Initiative. The following counties for Oklahoma included in this initiative for FY2015: Adair, Atoka, Bryan, Caddo, Cherokee, Choctaw, Cimarron, Coal, Delaware, Garvin, Greer, Harmon, Haskell, Hughes, Johnston, Kiowa, Latimer, LeFlore, Marshall, Mayes, McCurtain, McIntosh, Muskogee, Okfuskee, Okmulgee, Ottawa, Pittsburg, Pontotoc, Pushmataha, Seminole, Sequoyah and Tillman.

In order to promote and encourage rural community growth, provide awareness of opportunities through StrikeForce and to increase participation in StrikeForce there were nine outreach workshops held between May 12 and June 6, 2015. These workshops were held in Okfuskee, Caddo, Ottawa, Seminole, Atoka, Sequoyah, and Choctaw counties and in the rural community of Boley, Oklahoma. These workshops were strategically held in locations to reach multiple counties. The funds received in Oklahoma will be utilized to address resources concerns that are facing rural farmers and ranchers in the 32 counties. According to Dr. Carol Crouch, "These StrikeForce outreach workshops provided an excellent way to raise awareness of the opportunities for rural communities and individuals. These workshops were an excellent example of the strong working relationship between USDA partners. NRCS district conservationists; Thomas James, Stacey Mathis, Cynthia Ward, Mark Maples, Audra Fenton, Amanda Stanford, Michael Ramming, Steven Davied, Scott Pace and acting district conservationist, Derek Kelso played an important role in making these workshops possible and successful."

## Data Integrating System Turns 12,000 Dams Into a System of Intelligent Infrastructure

Hartford, Conn.-based USEngineering Solutions unveiled on June 23 a national system to detect incidents that could imperil nearly 12,000 dams across the country. It integrates multiple data streams, including sensors and national seismic and meteorologic data, to issue alerts when heavy storms or earthquakes threaten any dam in the system.

After years of development and testing, DamWatch is live and incorporating all the dams in 47 states that are "federally assisted" by the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

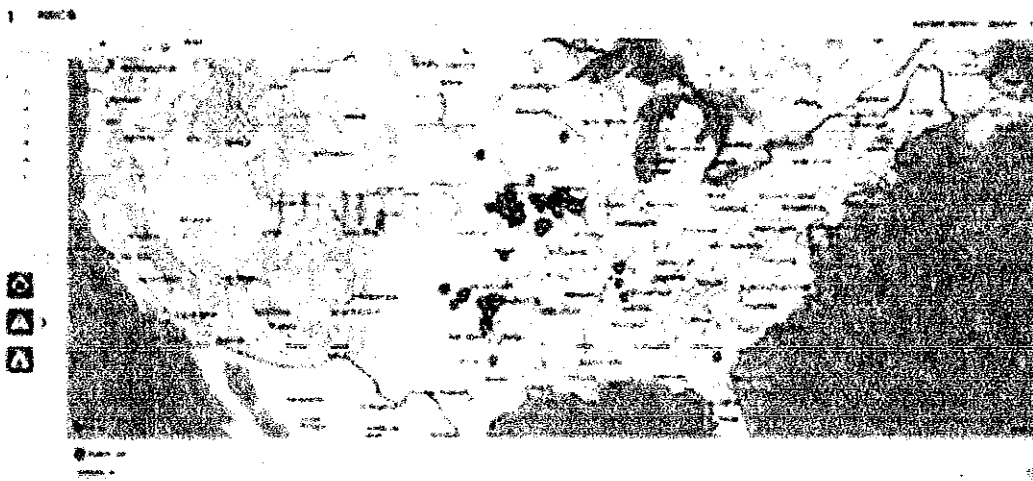
The system not only distributes alerts via fax, email or text to key parties, it also provides secure, web-based access to extensive design and maintenance data about the threatened facility.

"We're sold," says Larry Caldwell, a watershed specialist with the Oklahoma Conservation Commission and a retired veteran of 41 years with the NRCS. Oklahoma was a test state for the system. "We're monitoring 2,107 dams, and more than half will have reached their 50-year service life this year," Caldwell says. "Most were constructed to control flooding in agricultural areas, but now some of those areas have houses and businesses and industry."

The system has been tested by torrential rains this spring, sending alerts whenever spillways reached capacity and earthen, vegetated, auxiliary spillways were about to run. "We had 190 auxiliary spillways flow in May, and over 150 in June," Caldwell says.

During May's record rains in the central plains, nearly 1,000 DamWatch alerts helped NRCS personnel focus their response efforts, says NRCS Chief Jason Weller. Service personnel assisted project sponsors in reviewing the condition of hundreds of dams throughout the region.

Caldwell especially likes a feature that lets users create "information tickets" to capture institutional knowledge from the retiring generation of NRCS staffers and project sponsors involved in the original construction of the projects. "These are the little things that make the big difference that will be helpful for the next generation who become responsible for maintenance of the dams," he says. Caldwell says licensing the system, whose fees are borne by the NRCS, costs about \$18 per dam per year.

A staggering 90 percent of transgender people report experiencing harassment, mistreatment, or discrimination on the job, and 41 percent report attempting suicide compared to 1.6 percent of the general population.

### **The following laws offer protection for transgender federal workers:**

**Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964** prohibits sex discrimination in employment. In recent years, courts have increasingly held that discrimination because an employee or job applicant is transgender or gender non-conforming, or because he or she fails to conform to gender stereotypes, is sex discrimination under Title VII.

**The Civil Service Reform Act of 1978** prohibits discrimination by the Federal Government on the basis of "conduct which does not adversely affect the performance" of an applicant or employee.

**USDA's Civil Rights Policy Statement** includes specific protections on the basis of gender identity and expression.

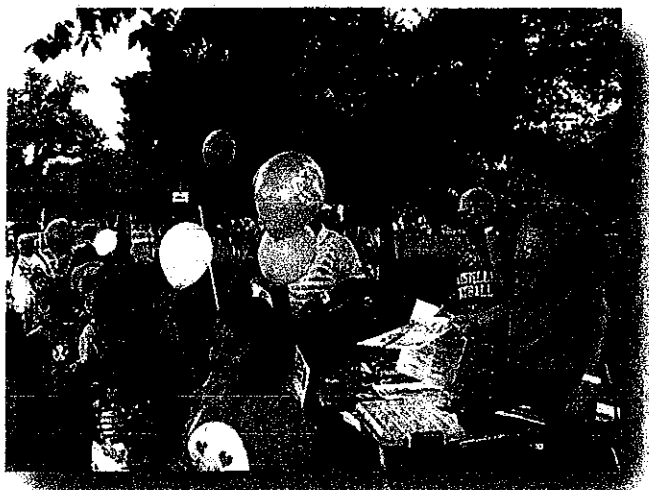
**Executive Order 11478** prohibits discrimination against civilian federal employees or applicants for employment on the basis of gender identity.

**Executive Order 11246** prohibits discrimination by federal contractors against their employees or applicants for employment on the basis of either sexual orientation or gender identity.

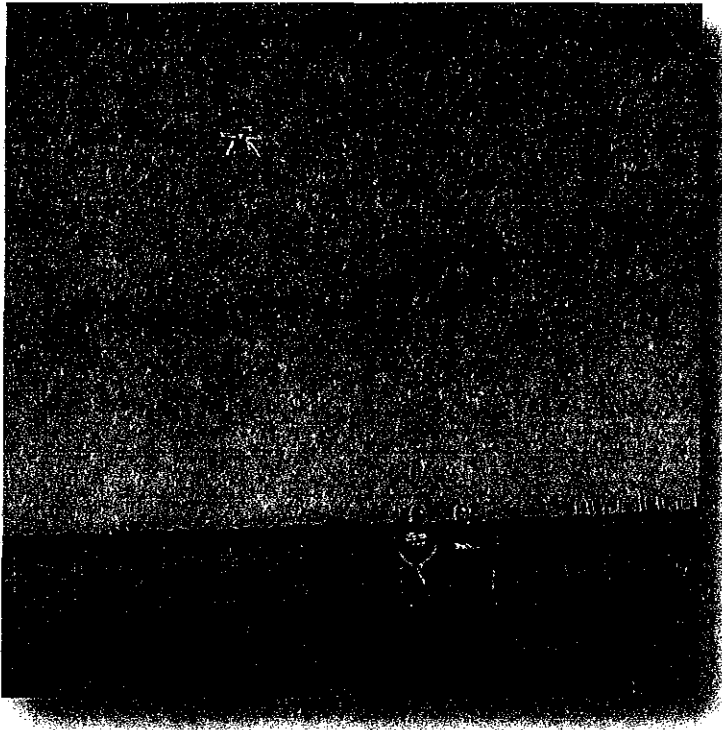

## Help From Above - submitted by Jennifer Mosteller, Soil Conservation Technician, Pauls Valley Field Service Center

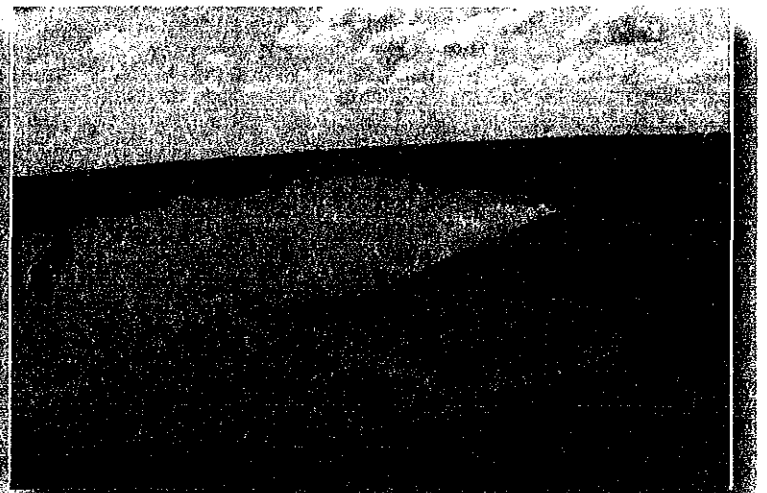

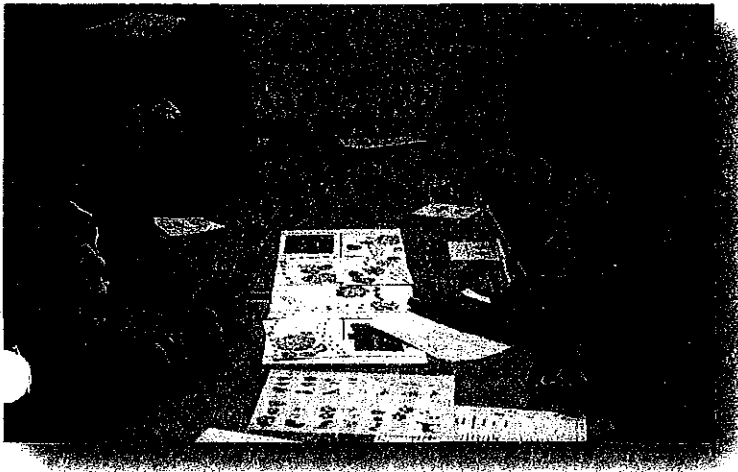
## Critter's Crossroads - submitted by Andrea Jones, Hughes County Conservation District

The Hughes County Conservation District gave a presentation to the Calvin 4H After School Program over one of their new educational resource trunks titled "Critters Crossroads". The 54 students and 7 adults learned about the different types of animals, how to tell the difference between similar tracks and how to read the signs that animals leave behind.

Each group read the track cards and guessed which and how many animals were at the site and what types of interactions they had. The students then tried to identify which animal was represented by three different signs: tracks, scat and skulls.

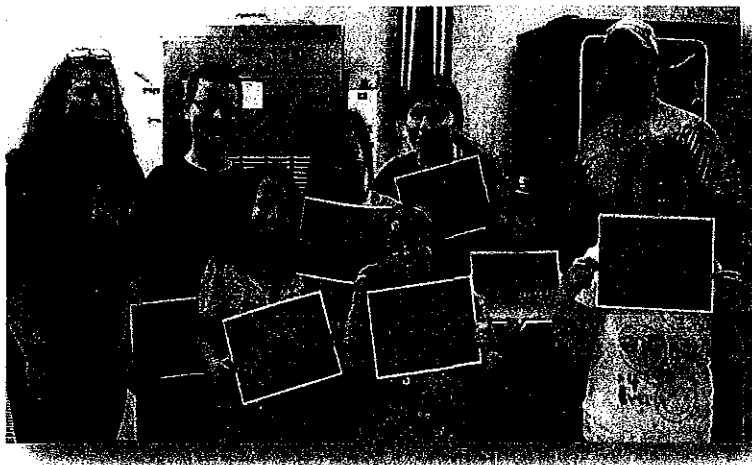

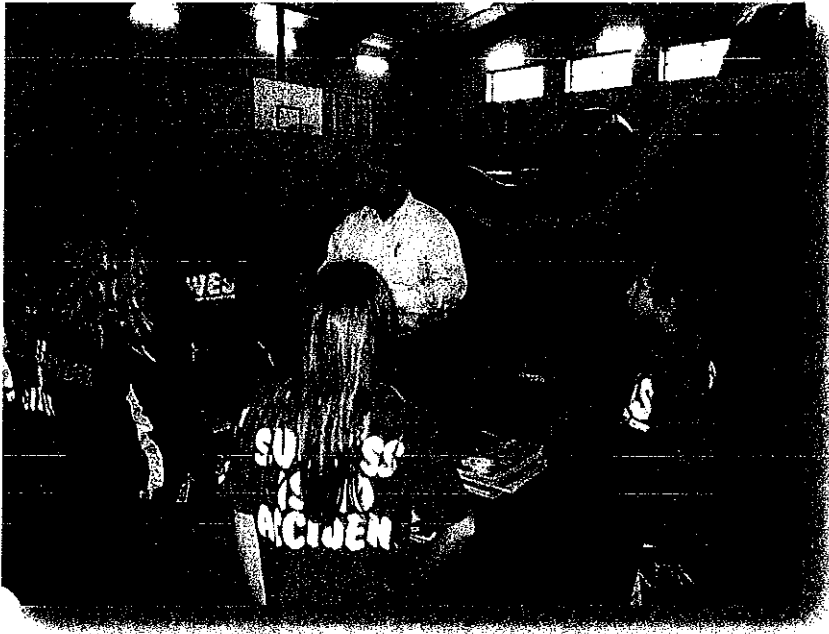
## **The Pauls Valley Land Judging Contest**

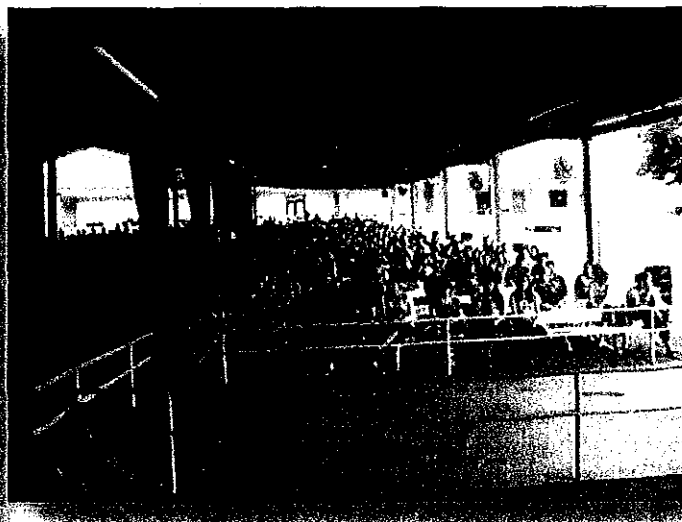

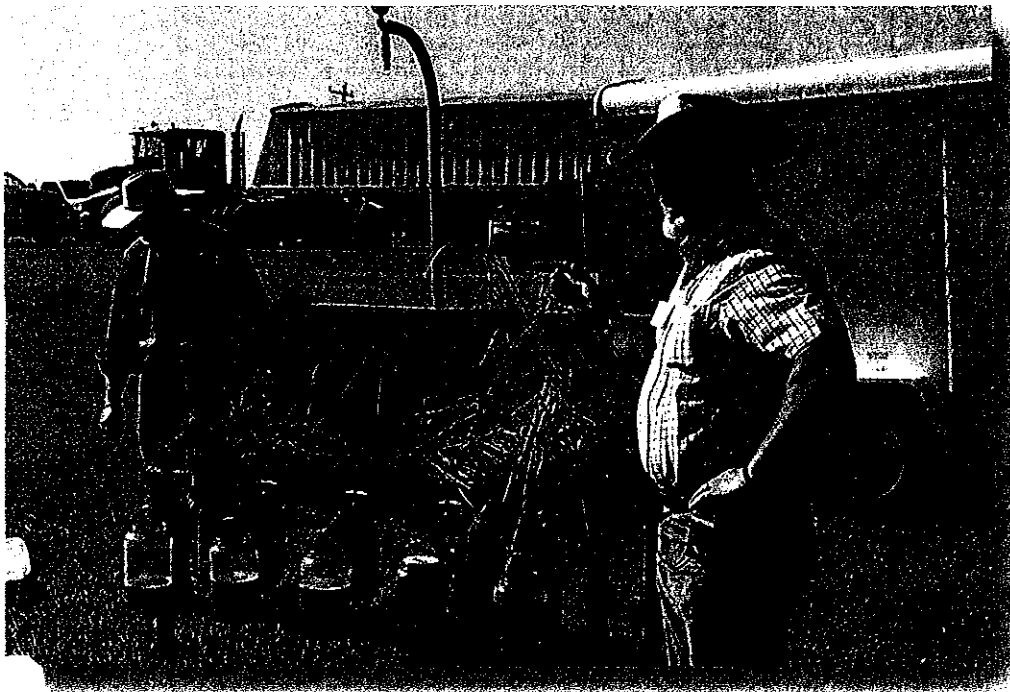
On July 14, No-Till on the Plains held a Whirlwind Expo at the Mindemann Farms near Apache. There was a great turnout of approximately 52 producers. Soil demonstrations, soil health demonstrations, and a rainfall simulator were apart of the morning events. These demonstrations gave producers an excellent look at why they should consider No Till as an option in their farming operations.

The Oklahoma Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) staff demonstrated the importance of residue cover for erosion prevention using the rainfall simulator. Also demonstrated was the importance of soil structure that can be restored and built using continuous no-till systems.

Oklahoma State University machinery specialist, Randy Taylor, shared his research on no-till seeding systems, GPS accuracy, yield monitor data, using sensors in variable rate applications of crop inputs and seeding equipment for no-till systems.

Matt Alig, a no-tiller in Okarche, talked about his unique no-till system. Alig has been no-tilling since 1997 and his operation consists of both cropland and grass. He prefers to graze crops rather than harvest grain given the extreme weather variability of freeze and hail risk, and is using several species of pasture and cover crops.

Jimmy Emmons, a no-tiller in Leedey, shared what he has learned from using no-till and cover crops. Emmons started using cover crops 3 years ago as a way to improve soil health and invested in soil moisture probes to assess how much water they were actually using.

After this demonstration was over, he took the aluminum pan with clean-tilled soil, dumped it upside down onto a plastic tarp, and noted the bottom of the pan was dry, meaning little or no moisture filtered through the soil.

The Choctaw Nation Farmers' Market was a good stage that lent itself well to interaction with these busy producers. Invited by Peggy Carlton, Choctaw Nation WIC & Seniors Farmers' Market Nutrition Program Coordinator, this July 1<sup>st</sup> outreach event reached 6 specialty producers.

Valerie Hannon, District Conservationist for the Durant Natural Resources Conservation Service, highlighted topics ranging from seasonal high tunnels and irrigation to transitioning to organic production. Packets were also distributed covering conservation planning assistance, Environmental Quality Incentives Program applications, healthy soils and historically underserved producers.

## Bryan County Annual Farm & Ranch Outreach Tour



The Bryan County Annual Farm & Ranch Outreach Tour, held on July 7, 2015, highlighted conservation in the Caddo area, the north central part of Bryan County. Forty-seven participants toured conservation highlights on four ranches before settling at the Caddo School Cafeteria. The tour visited a strand of eastern gamagrass that was established ten years ago with part of it being maintained with fertilizer, while the other part has had no fertilizer added.

The second stop featured an area where part of the brushy encroachment had been cleared and reclaimed. The Bryan Conservation District demonstrated their rental tree shear, then distributed information about other equipment that is available for completing conservation practices. Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) representatives discussed the use of the Environmental Quality Incentives Program to assist producers with brush management.

Sam Smith, Bryan County Conservation District supervisor and retired Agricultural Research Service and rancher, discussed his experience with the establishment and use of old world bluestem. NRCS discussed participation in the Conservation Stewardship Program.



Jordan Green, Rangeland Management Specialist, showed examples of various warm season grasses and discussed their advantages. Finally, the Farm Service Agency discussed some of their Farm Bill Programs. Sammie Adams encouraged the group to consider joining the Bryan County Cattle Producers Association. The group was then treated to a BBQ meal provided by Durant Stockyard owners, Jeff and Rebecca Hazaleus.

## Employee Spotlight: In Memory of Kevin Cook

For Kevin Cook, Civil Engineer at the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) State Office, a career with the agency offers the right amount of variety. After receiving his Bachelors of Science in Agricultural Engineering from Oklahoma State University (OSU), Kevin began working at the USDA Research Center. In June 2004, he shifted gears and started with NRCS. "I really enjoy both the people I work with and the variety of projects I get to be involved with," Kevin said. "We pick two to three topics and give the trainees a good overview," Kevin said. In the previous years, Kevin said they have covered topics such as pond staking and erosion. Kevin said he is satisfied with the work he is doing and his position as Civil Engineer. In his spare time, he spends time with his two children, who are each students at OSU, and enjoys camping and taking his boat to the lake.

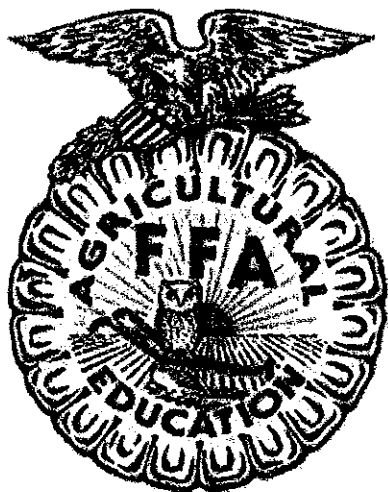

At the end of April, the Oklahoma Natural Resources Conservation Service and the Soil and Water Conservation Society sponsored the Soil and Water Conservation contest for the State FFA Career Development Event. 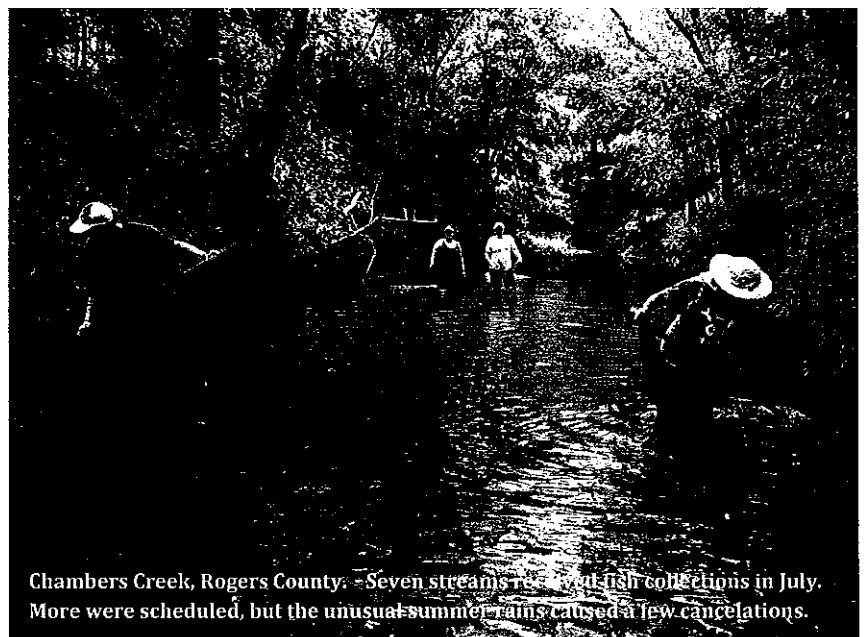
## August 2015

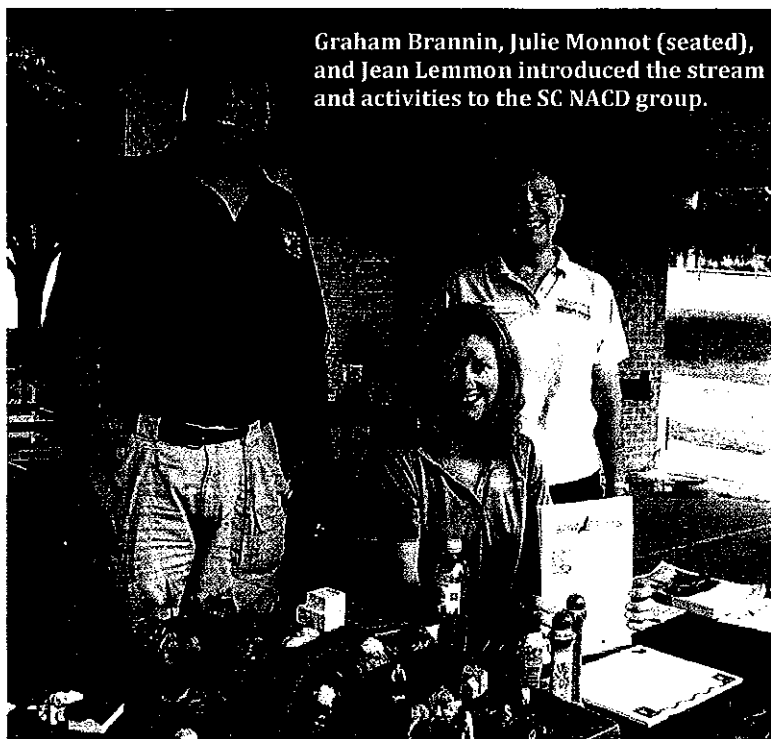
