MINUTES

CALL TO ORDER

The Oklahoma Conservation Commission met Monday, November 7, 2016, at the Agriculture Building Board Room located at 2800 N. Lincoln in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The meeting was called to order at 9:30 a.m. by Chairman Scotty Herriman. He stated this was a Regular Meeting scheduled in accordance with the Open Meeting Law, Title 25, Oklahoma Statutes, Sections 301 and following as amended. The agenda for this meeting was posted on Monday, October 31, 2016, at the front entrance of the building.

ATTENDANCE AT NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF CONSERVATION DISTRICTS ANNUAL MEETING

Trey Lam, Executive Director, presented dates and cost information for attendance at the National Association of Conservation Districts annual meeting to be held in Denver, Colorado. Mr. Jett and Mr. Rooker indicated they would not be able to attend. Mr. Clark, Mr. Herriman and Ms. LeGrand will look at schedules and be prepared to let the Commission know at the December meeting. Mr. Herriman asked that this item be placed on the December agenda for action.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR APPOINTMENT

Ms. Owen presented the recommendations for appointment of conservation district directors as listed in Exhibit #3. A motion was made by Mr. Clark and seconded by Ms. LeGrand to approve district director appointments as listed. Those voting aye were: Jett, Rooker, Herriman, LeGrand and Clark. Nay votes: none. Motion carried.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION MEETINGS FOR CALENDAR YEAR 2017

Ms. Owen presented the proposed calendar of scheduled meetings for 2017 as listed in Exhibit #4. She stated that the July meeting could be one of two dates. After discussion, a motion was made by Mr. Jett and seconded by Ms. LeGrand to approve the schedule as listed with the July meeting scheduled for Monday, July 10 and the time of the March meeting to be changed to 9:30 a.m.. Those voting aye were: Jett, Rooker, Herriman, LeGrand and Clark. Nay votes: none. Motion carried.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Mr. Rod Wanger with Farm Service Agency asked to address the Commission under public comments. He provided a written report and stated he was retiring effective December 31. He also noted that 9 counties have become eligible for the Livestock Forage Assistance Program due to drought. Mr. Wanger introduced Joy Alspach to the Commission. Ms. Alspach is an Ag Program Specialist in Conservation for Farm Service Agency. Ms. Alspach reported that there is a 24 million acre cap for the Conservation Reserve Program in Oklahoma. She also noted that November 10 is the cutoff date for Grassland Program sign up.

NEW BUSINESS

None.

CONSERVATION PARTNERSHIP REPORTS

Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry: Betty Thompson, Deputy Commissioner, stated that she and Secretary Reese attended the Tri National Accord meeting held in conjunction with representatives from Mexico and Canada. The meeting focused on GMO labeling.

Ms. Thompson reported that the Agriculture Board held their October meeting in the Oklahoma panhandle and celebrated Ag Appreciation in Cimarron County.

Ms. Thompson noted that Cherry Williams retired from the agency and that Keith Stout had been hired as the new Human Resources Director.

Ms. Thompson reported that Chief Flowers from the Ag Investigative Unit had recently recovered a trunk of memorabilia during a raid. He worked to track down the owners and presented the trunk to family member of the owners. They were very appreciative to receive the trunk.

Ms. Thompson noted that there will be approximately 45 new legislators after the election. Department of Agriculture is planning a welcome reception for the newly elected legislators for some time in late November.

Ms. Thompson provided Commissioner's with a new Feral Swine Brochure.

USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service: Gary O'Neill, State Conservationist, reviewed the quarterly partnership report with Commissioners. He also noted that the agency was operating under a continuing resolution until December 7.

Mr. O'Neill reported that the agency had paid out \$54 million in renewals for Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) payments. Sign up for CSP will begin middle of November.

Mr. O'Neill noted that the cutoff date for general Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP) signup is November 18.

Mr. O'Neill reported that the announcement for student internships with the agency should be coming out this week.

Mr. O'Neill announced that Stacy Riley had been selected as the Assistant State Conservationist for Programs.

Oklahoma Association of Conservation Districts: Steve House, President, stated that the association had selected Joe Caughlin, Kay County Conservation District, as the Area 2 director. He also thanked Commission and NRCS staff for their assistance with area meetings.

OKLAHOMA CONSERVATION COMMISSION MEMBERS

Mr. Jett attended the Governor's Water Conference and reported on the discussions held regarding shrinking water resources nationwide. He also attended the OACD Area 1 meeting.

Mr. Clark attended the OACD Area 5 meeting and reported that he felt it was an upbeat and positive meeting with good discussion and an attitude of cooperation among conservation districts.

Ms. LeGrand attended the Governor's Water Conference and noted that Oklahoma Water Resources Board was asking cities and towns to work cooperatively together. She also reported on attending the OACD Area 1 meeting and Kim Tweed's retirement reception.

Mr. Rooker reported that he had attended the OACD Area 2 meeting and Kim Tweed's retirement reception.

Mr. Herriman attended the OACD Area 3 meeting and served on a soil health panel discussion. He indicated that it was good meeting but that we needed to make an effort to deliver this message to active farmers and ranchers.

OKLAHOMA CONSERVATION COMMISSION STAFF

Executive Director: Mr. Lam stated a written report is in the packet. He invited everyone to participate with the agency this morning fixing S'Mores as part of our state charitable campaign.

Mr. Lam reported that the area meetings are going well and have been generating good discussion among conservation districts. He thanked agency staff for their assistance with logistics and programing of the meetings.

Mr. Lam reported that the Executive Assistant position with the agency has been opened and that that we are receiving applications. Application period closes November 23.

Mr. Lam attended a meeting of the OKA institute at East Central University in Ada. The newly established institute is headed up by former state senator Susan Paddack. The goal of the institute is to bridge the gap between sustainable water management and economic development.

Mr. Lam also attended a meeting of the Western Farmers Soil Health Group at the Noble Foundation.

Water Quality Program: Shanon Phillips, Director, stated a written report is in the packet. Ms. Phillips reported that she and Greg Kloxin attended the Non-Point Source managers meeting this past week in Boston. She noted that the northeast United States has been in a drought for just 5 months but communities are already struggling with water supply. She indicated that they had opportunity to talk about soil health education and how this interacts with water quality management.

Ms. Phillips also reported that the Government Accounting Office and Office of Management and Budget has been investigating the administration of the US EPA 319 program and are finally satisfied with the management of the program.

Ms. Phillips reported that the Water Quality Division had completed end of year review with Region 6 EPA last week.

Ms. Phillips reported that the construction portion of the partnership project with Oklahoma Department of Transportation has been completed. The work was being done on State Highway 10 in northeast Oklahoma.

Office of Geographic Information and Technical Services: Mike Sharp, Director, stated a written report is in the packet. He reported that land parcel data would become available for Nowata County on OK Maps in the near future. He also stated that the GIS Council met last Friday.

Abandoned Mine Land Reclamation Program: Mike Sharp, Assistant AML Director, stated a written report is in the packet. He reported that work continues on two active sites – Reeves Phase 3 in Sequoyah County and Greer Phase 3 in Rogers County.

A pre-bid meeting is scheduled November 16 for repair of an underground mine site in the town of McCurtain in Haskell County.

Dr. Sharp reported that the design is complete on the Sparks project in Muskogee County.

Conservation Programs: Tammy Sawatzky, Director, stated a written report is in the packet. She reported that repair work for Caddo Site 27 in Carter County is headed to bid next week with an estimated cost of \$1 million for repairs.

She also noted that we are still waiting on a design for repair of the Rainy Mountain site in Kiowa County.

Ms. Sawatzky stated that bids would be opened tomorrow for the Barnitz 5 rehabilitation project in Dewey County.

Ms. Sawatzky reported that the watershed technicians and watershed aides had been in Wagoner County working on Kadashan Bottom sites and in Little River Conservation District to clean up Whitegrass Waterhole sites.

Assistant Director: Ms. Owen reported that the OACD Area meetings have been well attended.

Ms. Owen noted that while the discussion between districts to establish memorandums of understanding have started slow, that districts are beginning to communicate with one another and put plans in place to cooperate and work together.

The next regular meeting of the Oklahoma Conservation Commission will be held on Monday, December 5, 2016, in the Agriculture Building Board Room, 2800 N. Lincoln Boulevard, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma beginning at 9:30 a.m.








Of the 158 named rivers that flow through the State of Colorado, all but two have their headwaters within our state. Although there are about 17 major rivers that have their start in the mountains of Colorado, the headwaters of the Arkansas, South Platte, Rio Grande, and Colorado Rivers are the life blood of our watersheds, agriculture, wildlife, recreation, hydro-power, and municipal water supplies, both statewide and nationally.

Please join us on Wednesday, February 1, 2017, for a special afternoon tour that will include a bus ride to the Continental Divide atop the Rocky Mountains on the summit of Berthoud Pass (11,307 feet in elevation.) You will be able to see on both sides of the divide: the western side that eventually drains to the Pacific Ocean and the eastern side that reaches the Atlantic Ocean. Informative speakers will explain about the importance of the amount of annual snow that falls here, how it affects at least eighteen other states, and how much of our country is dependent on this annual moisture.

O THE SITUATION

According to the USDA, there are over 6 million feral swine across the United States that are responsible for more than \$1.5 billion in damages and control costs. In Oklahoma, the population is estimated to be between 430,000 to 1.6 million, according to the Noble Foundation. Feral swine cause

significant damage to crops, natural resources, and livestock through rooting, erosion and disease transmission.


Feral swine cause damage to agriculture by trampling, eating, and rooting farmers' crops. They carry numerous diseases which can be transmitted to domestic livestock such as Brucellosis, Leptospirosis, Pathogenic E. coli, Tuberculosis, foot and mouth disease, Hepatitis E, swine flu, Pseudorabies, and several others.

Feral swine can also destroy property such as fences, tribal sacred sites and burial grounds, cemeteries, archaeological sites and digs, as well as disturbance to other structures, landscaping, vegetation and soils.

Evidence of feral swine in an area can be seen through rooting, digging, wallows in moist areas, trees marked with mud and pig hair, tunnels and trails through vegetation, tracks, and feces.

To combat the growing population in Oklahoma, the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry (ODAFF) implemented the Feral Swine Control Act (title 2, Chapter 1, Article 6 of the Oklahoma Statues). Since 2011, 27,310 feral hogs have been eliminated by ODAFF in response to damage reports in Oklahoma. In 2015, 7,808 feral hogs were eliminated, a 221% increase from the 2,426 killed in 2011.

In 2016, Governor Fallin approved ODAFF's proposed changes to the administrative rules of the Feral Swine Control Act, including several measures to prevent the further spread of the invasive species and better protect agriculture resources while still permitting lawful hunting, trapping and transportation of feral swine. It is illegal to release feral swine into the wild anywhere in Oklahoma.



HUNTING

- ODAFF is supportive of private property and landowner rights to hunt feral swine, however trapping may be a
 more effective means of eradicating feral swine.
- Under Section 6-604 and 6-605, any person with the permission of the landowner may remove feral swine
 from private or public property during daylight hours. A special night hunting exemption must be obtained
 from ODWC to kill feral swine at night.

NIGHT HUNTING

- A night shooting exemption can be obtained by the deed-holding landowner or written designee from the ODWC by contacting their county game warden.
- The exemption is valid for one year.
- Shooting hogs from, to, on or across any public roadway is not permitted.
- Landowner or written designee can allow anyone to night shoot on the landowner's property by providing
 written or electronic permission except during the 16-day regular firearms deer season. During this period,
 only the landowner or written designee may night shoot on the property listed on the exemption.
- Night vision equipment, night scopes, hand-held or other powerful light, vehicle mounted headlights and motor-driven land conveyances are allowed. There are no firearm restrictions for night shooting feral swine.

TRAPPING

- ODAFF Wildlife Services offers technical assistance to landowners wishing to control their own feral swine, and direct control as resources exist. Wildlife Specialists cover one to three counties depending on assignment.
- Trapping is not only highly effective in capturing feral hogs; it is also the best option to eliminate a sounder (group) of pigs in a short period of time.
- The most common traps are corral and cage.

TRANSPORTING AND HANDLING FACILITIES

- ODAFF has implemented stricter rules on transportation and handling of live feral swine in order to encourage trapping and elimination of feral swine while discouraging illegal transportation of release of feral swine.
- All transporters must have an annual transporter license as well as a 24-hour transport permit (obtained from ODAFF) prior to each movement of live feral swine
- Transporters may only unload live feral swine from the transport vehicle at a licensed handling facility, licensed sporting facility or slaughter facility. Transporters with a valid 24-hour transport permit may maintain live feral swine at their home premises as long as they are not removed from the original transport vehicle.

SPORTING FACILITIES

- ODAFF has implemented a moratorium on feral swine sporting facilities as well as improved record keeping of
 feral swine purchases and eliminations. These efforts assist in regulating transportation of feral swine and
 documenting the number of feral swine eliminated at each facility.
- Sporting facilities must maintain a perimeter fence made of solid walls, game fence, or other material
 constructed in a manner adequate to reasonably prevent the escape of enclosed feral swine, and the
 unsolicited additions of feral swine from outside the enclosure, which is inspected annually by ODAFF.
- The owner or operator shall keep a record of the number of feral swine added to the facility, the contact information of the transporter who supplied them, the date of release of the swine into the facility, and the number of head removed from the facility, the method of removal, the date of the removal, and the contact information of the personal responsible for the removal.



REPORT TO Oklahoma Conservation Commission OKLAHOMA STATE FSA OFFICE

Administrative

- Terry Peach resigned as SED at the end of September. Lyndal Stoup, is the current Acting SED. He is the District Director for the southwest area of the state.
- FSA is on a continuing resolution until December 7.
- Expecting 7 retirements on December 31 in the state.

Production and Payment Eligibility Programs

ARC/PLC

- Signup for ARC/PLC is November 1 through August 1, 2017
- ARC/PLC payments have been issued to producers. All were sent in the month of October
- ARC County payments may or may not have been applicable to a county. This uses the county average yield versus the current
 yield and price to figure payment.
- NASS reporting is crucial to the ARC program

NAP

- NAP premium bills for went out in September for 2015 NAP buy up coverage. Payments were to be made in 30 days or the
 amount went to a receivable with FSA.
- 2016 NAP buy-up coverage premium bills will be sent out in January 2017 with 30 days to pay. This will be the normal for NAP buy-up coverage now for January of the following year for premium bills.
- November 30 is the final date to elect NAP coverage for perennial forage and pecans.

AGI

 Adjusted Gross Income provisions apply FSA and NRCS program participants. Participants must file the CCC-941 for AGI to receive benefits. The AGI limit is a 3-year prior year average which cannot exceed \$900,000 to receive benefits.

Conservation

- Annual CRP payments were made in October totaling \$1.7B nationwide. Oklahoma sent out approximately \$24.6M in payments to CRP participants.
- The USDA and FSA continue to adjust to the CRP acreage cap of 24 million acres. There will be some forthcoming announcements on CRP.
- Oklahoma has received \$10.7M in funding for 2015 and 2016 ECP with a number of counties waiting to receive funding. The state
 has paid \$4.7M to affected producers for the 2015 and 2016 damage through ECP.

Farm Loan Program

New EZ Guarantee program allow a producer to obtain a loan for operating or ownership up to \$100,000 with minimal paperwork.

Price Support

- Wheat producers have had opportunity to obtain a Loan Deficiency Payment (LDP) on their 2016 wheat production prior to loosing beneficial interest of the crop. The LDP rate has varied from \$.01 to \$.45 per bushel based on the daily posted county price of wheat. Oklahoma has paid the following LDP's for 2016 wheat:
 - Loan Deficiency Payments 6126 payments for \$13M
 - o Wheat Graze-out Payments \$5M
 - Wheat Loans (MALs) 573 loans for \$31M
 - National Wheat Loan Rate is \$2.94/bu. Oklahoma ranges from \$3.08 to \$3.32/bu
- Acreage Reporting Dates Upcoming:
 - o November 15 Perennial Grass
 - January 17 Small Grains
- Livestock Forage Program has triggered in 9 counties: Wagoner, Muskogee, Cherokee, Garvin, Murray, Johnston, Coal, Atoka, and Bryan Counties. Producers are eligible for a one-month payment equal to \$18,10/Animal Unit.

Tribe's High Tunnel Project Provides a Harvest for the People

The Eastern Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma is growing. From a recycling center to well managed pastures of grazing cattle, their lands straddling the Oklahoma-Missouri border are a hive of activity. With a little help from their latest high tunnel pilot project, Chief Glenna Wallace is hoping not even the changing seasons will slow them down.

"The Tribe is in the process of developing an Agriculture Department with the goal of expanding our food production," Wallace said. "This project will help us do that."

Similar to a greenhouse, but lighter and often not requiring electricity, high tunnels offer a range of benefits to growers. Often a primary motivation for setting up a high tunnel is to extend the growing season for fruit and vegetable plants. High tunnels can also improve plant and soil health, reduce nutrient and pesticide transportation and reduce energy inputs by providing a local source of fresh produce throughout the year.

The Tribe's high tunnel is nestled in a clearing surrounded by recently planted wildflower strips to support pollinators. The air is thick inside, and the plastic skin glows a soft green from the surrounding pine trees. Chief Wallace explains this first high tunnel began with the idea of creating a people's garden for the community. This year, the Tribe is experimenting with the concept to see what crops will work best with their soil and weather conditions.

Chief Wallace smiles proudly as she points out individual plants: "We have squash, cucumber, eggplant, onions, herbs, peppers, tomatoes, a big variety."

The harvest from this crop will be integrated into meals for the Eastern Shawnee's elderly program, but as the project enters the next phase, they anticipate feeding many more people. A kitchen is planned for canning produce followed by a second high tunnel to supply food for the childcare center.



The new high tunnel system will allow the Tribe to grow crops even as temperatures drop in fall and winter.

"We want to use high tunnels to support nutrition, elders, whole families. We want to grow the project as much as is viable," said Chad Kelly, Tribal Administrator.

By working with their local USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) field office and Tribal Liaison, the Eastern Shawnee Tribe received assistance to build the high tunnel using the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP). The program has also assisted with other projects on their land, including a well and water tanks for cattle.

Currently, the Tribe leases their pasture for other farmers to graze cattle on. In time, Chief Wallace hopes they will be able to raise their own cattle and offer complete meals grown and raised entirely by the Tribe.


In Oklahoma, veterans comprise 10 percent of NRCS's workforce, including two members of the State Leadership Team: Gilbert Guerrero, Assistant State

Restoring Wetlands, Creating Opportunity

The Agricultural
Conservation Easement
Program (ACEP) was in
enacted with the 2014 Farm
bill. ACEP has two
components: Agriculture
Land Easements (ALE) and
Wetland Reserve
Easements (WRE).

Mr. Kim Biggs purchased 240 acres of farm ground in Noble County as an investment in farming and a place to occasionally hunt deer. The property is along Red Rock creek and flooded as many years as not. After consulting with the NRCS field office in

Perry, District Conservationist Rusty Peterson explained how the farm bill programs could help with the conservation goals Mr. Biggs had on the property. This is when Mr. Biggs was introduced to ACEP-WRE.

This program is designed to restore and enhance wetlands and improve habitat. Eligible lands include farmed or converted wetlands that can be successfully and cost-effectively restored.

Today, the hydrology of the property has been restored and native grasses have been planted. Mr. Biggs now has a 221 acre WRE where he can enjoy hunting for many years to come.

Citizen Potawatomi Nation and Volunteers Plant Milkweeds on Tribal Lands

Shawn Fleming, NRCS District Conservationist, reported that on May 10, 2016, the Citizen Potawatomi Nation was the first of seven Oklahoma Tribes to plant milkweed on tribal lands.

According to Dr. Carol Crouch, NRCS State-Tribal Liaison, "Oklahoma is a main corridor for the monarch butterfly. Milkweed is usually targeted as a weed, and unfortunately it is the monarch's main food source. If you look at a tribal jurisdiction map of Oklahoma you can see that nearly all of the monarch's migration falls within tribal boundaries."

Seven Oklahoma Tribes received grants through the U.S Fish & Wildlife Foundation to help restore habitat for the near-extinct monarch. The grant included a seasonal high tunnel and training on how to successfully plant milkweed and generate seedlings for future plantings. The Chickasaw Nation, Seminole Nation, Osage Nation, Eastern Shawnee Tribe, Miami Nation and Muscogee Creek Nation have also started planting milkweed on their Tribal lands.

"It was very rewarding to see USDA partners, the CPN, tribal members, members of the community coming to gather to plant the milkweed to restore the Monarch habitat," said Fleming.

Oklahoma Healthy Soils Project

The Oklahoma Association of Conservation Districts (OACD) Healthy Soils Project is a voluntary effort to conserve the natural resources of Oklahoma by empowering agriculture producers to participate in proven conservation practices on their land. The project is part of the NRCS Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP).


Through the Healthy Soils Project, OACD will establish 10 demonstration farms over five years with two farms in each of the five regions of the state. The farms will be 80 acres in size and will be selected through a competitive, transparent application process. Farmers will be provided with a conservation mentor, seed for planting cover crops, technical advice from agronomists and testing and monitoring equipment.

OACD is accepting applications for participation in the project through January 31, 2017 from individuals interested in establishing a demonstration farm in Area V (Atoka, Bryan, Choctaw, Coal, Haskell, Hughes, Johnston, Latimer, LeFlore, Marshall, McCurtain, McIntosh, Okfuskee, Pittsburg, Pontotoc and Pushmataha Counties). Selected producers will receive up to \$115 per acre for seed cost, fair rental rate compensation, technical assistance and testing/monitoring equipment. Eligible producers must qualify for EQIP as defined by the 2014 U.S. Farm Bill and submit a full Healthy Soils Project application to OACD by Jan. 31, 2017.

Unique Repair Challenges at Caddo Creek Dam 27

Chris Stoner, State Conservation Engineer, and Valerie Glasgow, Agricultural Engineer, attended the annual ASDSO conference in Philadelphia, PA. Approximately 900-1000 people attended the conference. Chris presented a paper and Valerie answered questions on the **Emergency Watershed Protection** (EWP) design on the auxiliary spillway for Caddo Dam 27. The Caddo 27 auxiliary spillway was severely damaged during the storms in June 2015. The auxiliary spillway was built into a rock hillside. The solution was to extend the dike further downstream.

This would prevent the erosion around the end of the dike from head cutting into the auxiliary spillway crest section. The dike extension is approximately 100 feet long and 50 feet high due to the topography of the area. Construction will begin soon.

During the ASDSO conference, both Chris and Valerie attended numerous sessions on all topics of safety of dams including articulated concrete blocks, seepage issues, operation and maintenance concerns and extreme precipitation issues.

In Memory of Stacey Mathis



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Application Deadline for Flagship Conservation Program, EQIP, Nov. 18

STILLWATER, Okla., Oct. 20, 2016—Applications for participation in the current round of the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) are due by Nov. 18, 2016. Eligible landowners and agricultural producers should submit inquiries and applications to their local USDA Field Service Center.

EQIP is a voluntary program through the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) which provides financial and technical assistance to agricultural producers to plan and implement conservation practices that improve soil, water, air and related natural resources on agricultural land and non-industrial private forest land.

"EQIP continues to help new and established farmers and ranchers address natural resource concerns and make the most of their land," said Gary O'Neill, NRCS State Conservationist for Oklahoma. "The program is the first step for many producers to achieving conservation success on their land. With a number of special fund pools such as the high tunnel systems initiative, organic initiative and StrikeForce which targets persistent poverty-stricken rural communities, EQIP offers something for every kind of producer."

NRCS accepts and processes EQIP applications throughout the year. However, application deadlines are periodically set to consider eligible applications for funding. Applications submitted after these dates will be evaluated for funding during later funding opportunities. Producers must submit a complete program application, establish "farm records," and other documentation to support eligibility to be considered for financial assistance through EQIP.

"EQIP's strong record of improving soil, water and air quality are proof that voluntary conservation works. I encourage farmers, ranchers and landowners across the state to speak with their local NRCS office about participation in EQIP before the November 18 deadline," O'Neill said.

Conservation Stewardship Program

The Conservation Stewardship Program – CSP – is the largest conservation program in the United States. Starting as the Conservation Security Program in 2002, a complex watershed-based pilot with just 2 million acres in its first year, the Conservation Stewardship Program has evolved to a nationwide program that has enrolled more than 70 million acres since 2010. Fifteen years of experience and evolution in the program bring us to where we are today, poised to deliver improvements to a program that kicks conservation up another notch.

Through CSP, agricultural producers and forest landowners earn payments for actively managing, maintaining, and expanding conservation activities like cover crops, rotational grazing, ecologically-based pest management, buffer strips, and pollinator and beneficial insect habitat – all while maintaining active agriculture production on their land. Crop producers, ranchers, dairy farmers, forest landowners, poultry producers, organic farmers, and specialty crop farmers all participate in the program. It is delivering real results on the ground and the nation's natural resources.

CSP is Unique

CSP taps into producers' deep-rooted commitment to conservation. CSP participants voluntarily enroll in the program because it helps them enhance natural resources

and improve their business operations - providing food, fiber, and energy. Participants enroll their entire ag operation in the program under a 5 year contract, with the option to renew for another 5 years. NRCS helps producers maintain or improve the existing conservation activities on their operations, and adopt new ones. The program offers greater incentives for producers who want to kick their conservation up a notch with bundles of enhancements with a higher payment rates.

The Evolution of CSP

CSP has proven to be effective, with a large enrollment and high demand, but it's important that it also be progressive and keep up with technology and producer's desires to improve resources on their land. Through feedback from across the country we made improvements to make a good program even better.

Our goal is a program that is clear and understandable, is flexible, and accommodates local priorities. We want it to be customer friendly while providing more conservation options to a wide variety of producers.

What's New

Straightforward Conservation Process

CSP has relied on a tool called the Conservation Measurement Tool (CMT) to evaluate operations and

determine payments. We know that the results from the tool are difficult to understand and to explain. We are redesigning CSP tools to create a clearer and more logical process – from initial performance evaluation to application ranking and payments.

The new approach draws on planners' conservation knowledge and experience to work with applicants to complete the performance evaluation and identify additional activities that would work best for their operations. Applicants and planners work together to identify resource concerns that are not currently being addressed and discuss alternative conservation activities that can be implemented to address those resource issues. Ultimately, this helps the producer make decisions that best fit their conservation goals while addressing resource concerns.

Better Integrated with Other NRCS Programs


The approach strengthens CSP's connection to the agency's conservation planning process by clearly connecting solutions with identified. CSP will be better integrated into the continuum of assistance we offer, instead of it being the more isolated program approach that it has been in the past.

The CSP tools are revamped and will be integrated with existing program software, and the reporting mechanisms for overall performance measurement and contract management application tools for our other programs. For instance modifications for operational adjustments will be greatly simplified and similar to the processes used for other conservation programs, allowing more flexibilities to modify participant's contracts based on operational changes. These updates to CSP provide more effective ways to align practices and enhancements with the agronomy and ecology of farming and ranching and ultimately help promote more sustainable production

Better Connection to our Conservation Standards

Enhancements now are linked closely to the conservation practices. Even more opportunities for conservation are offered through the program, with up to 40 percent more enhancements (173 total) and 100

percent more conservation practices. Less than 10 percent of former enhancements are no longer available (11 total). Many of the new enhancements reflect recommended



Accommodating Local Priorities

We're updating CSP to allow greater opportunities for local input. NRCS in consultation with local partners and stakeholder groups will focus the program to address natural resource concerns specific to the state and on ways to get the good stewards into the program. There are flexibilities to establish targeted resource concerns and applicable the conservation activities in local fund pools. Additionally, the application ranking tool will use local issue questions to prioritize applications that are effectively addressing the identified local priorities. States continue to be able to identify additional enhancements needed for local resource concerns.

Continuing the Improvements

70 million acres of productive agricultural and forest land enrolled in CSP translates into a massive, concerted effort to conserve and improve natural resources – and the effort of these farmers, ranchers and forest landowners is commendable. The conservation benefits achieved through CSP on private lands benefit all of us through improved water and air quality, increased soil health, and improved wildlife habitat, to name just a few.

With more enhancements and better results reporting tools, we are going to be able to tell our customers what these enhancement activities mean for their operation. We are going to be able to better tell the story of what the nation's biggest conservation program is doing for natural resources, for agriculture, and for the nation

NRCS is committed to continuing the evolution of CSP to ensure increased success of the program and that it remains effective for all of agriculture and private land forestry.
